INTRODUCTION.

The most natural as well as the most philosophical arrangement of a book for the home treatment of diseases is neither by the ordinary medical classifications, nor by regions as head, stomach, pelvis, etc., but by functions, for of what use is a head if it cannot think, or of a heart if it does not beat, or of a stomach if it cannot digest?

Therefore this book is a treatment of diseases by the functional derangements that they exhibit, and by which

their presence is known.

If this new method seem inconvenient at first sight to the reader, he has but to glance at the *Outline Plan* next to the title page to see its comprehensiveness, symmetry and utility.

And if one is at a loss to know under what function some symptom may be found, a moment's examination of

the Index-Glossary will disclose it.

Biochemistry discards as unphilosophical and unscientific the names and classifications of diseases as they are found in the medical text books.

Why not then, have an arrangement of its own, based upon its own cardinal principles, and in harmony with its own use of remedies?

The important point to be fixed in the mind of the reader is that names of diseases signify nothing.

The functional disturbance is what is to be studied, and to THAT, not to a name, the remedies are to be fitted.

Other books lay down treatment for certain diseases which are to be distinguished by a few detailed symptoms, but as a matter of fact, the similarity between the symptoms is so close, and the frequency of other symptoms that

are not named is so great, that laymen are at their wit's end to know just what disease to treat, and there is a period in the onset of febrile diseases when not a physician on earth can tell with certainty whether he has one disease or another to combat.

All this perplexity is avoided by our method.

A fever is a functional disturbance of the circulation, and should be treated as that purely and simply, without

regard to anything that may follow.

Of course this cannot be safely done in the use of drugpoisons. Prof. Alonzo Clark says, "All our curative agents (so-called) are poisons, and as a consequence every dose diminishes the patient's vitality." But our remedies are RECONSTRUCTIVE always, therefore are always safe; a consideration of immense moment in placing curatives in the hands of the people.

Medicines have been defined by Dr. C. Wesselhoeft in a lecture before the advanced students of Harvard Medical School as "substances which if consumed by a well

person will make that well person sick."

According to this accepted definition the Biochemic

Salts are not medicines.

Very well; why employ medicines when remedies (reconstructives) are efficient to cure? The use of this book will demonstrate the superiority of remedies over medicines, and the utter uselessness of the latter, except as germicides in appropriate cases, as explained in Chapter VI.

Those who recognize diseases only by their names find it hard to understand how one remedy can be appropriate

for many and dissimilar diseases.

But when they come to see that the same condition underlies these diseases and that the true philosophy of cure consists in *changing* that *condition*, then the beautiful simplicity of the system explained in these pages becomes apparent.

Why should two thousand medicines be needed to correct the wrong conditions of the few elements out of which man is made?

Nature is severely simple in her methods; man is osten-

tatiously complex in his.

CHAPTER L

THE NEED OF A SAFE AND EFFICIENT HOME TREATMENT.

The general need of a safe and reliable system of home practice is apparent from these considerations, viz.:

1. The fact that some home practice is almost always resorted to before calling a physician. It may be to avoid the expense of the physician's services, or the immediate relief of pain, or from the general feeling that "something ought to be done," but for some reason home efforts are and will be made. Therefore it is important that they be

rightly directed.

2. The limited resources of families, or their distance from physicians in whom they have confidence, necessitates reliance upon home practice all through many sicknesses, to the exclusion of all other helps. It may be a hard necessity, but very many, especially in thinly-settled regions, must combine in one person the office of parent, nurse and physician all through the weary, anxious hours of lingering sickness even to the end, be that end life or death. That the chances for life will be greatly augmented by a safe and efficient home practice none who believe in the law of cause and effect can doubt.

And common humanity strongly insists that if the end must be bereavement, the sufferers have the best aid that a reliable home system of practice can give, so that they may be solaced as others who employ physicians are, by the reflection, "all was done that could be" for recovery.

 Home practice as ordinarily found is fraught with the serious danger of the great probability that the nature of the disease may be mistaken, i. e., wrong diagnosis made. Medical books describe hundreds of diseases, each with its own peculiar symptoms, yet many resembling each other so closely that ordinary physicians are often unable to discriminate between them, and a skillful diagnostican (one who diagnoses or detects disease) is among the rarest of medical experts. That the common people should mistake the disease is therefore the most probable of all probable things, and if the error does occur no one can tell the mischief that may result. Hence it is a common experience of physicians to find diseases seriously aggravated by the mistakes of home efforts to relieve. It is therefore of great consequence that those efforts, if they cannot be free from a mistaken direction, may at least escape the the baneful results of injurious medication.

4. Home practice as ordinarily prescribed in books of home treatment is attended with the great probability that

the remedies will be misapplied.

If they are allophatic or eclectic, some in most frequent use are deadly poisons; many are in their nature deleterious, and nearly all are over-dosed. The narcotics, opiates, sedatives, stimulants, etc., most generally prescribed would amaze an intelligent observer were he not so accustomed to the sight. But familiarity with them does not change the nature of opium, chloral, nux vomica, digitalis or the bromides.

Physicians deplore the uncertainty which attends the administration of the most deadly drugs arising from the variations in the proportions of their active principles in different preparations, e. g., opium may contain eight or sixteen per cent of morphine to the grain, i. e., one dose may be one dose, or it may be two. Belladonna contains atropine varying from 0.25 per cent to 0.75 per cent.

Other drugs vary still more widely, yet the books dose

the drug at a fixed quantity, and physicians prescribe them accordingly.

But the "accidents" are attributed to other causes, and so the death-dealing work goes on.

Is it likely to be any less when the same drugs are em-

ployed in home prescriptions?

If the medicines are homeopathic, the poisons are prescribed more frequently than the harmless agents, and if they have any efficiency to heal when wisely used, they are equally efficient to injure if unwisely employed. And that they must be unwisely employed is a necessity arising from the complexity of the system itself. Says Dr. H. A. Anderson, "When we give four thousand symptoms with aggravations for nearly every hour of the day to a single drug, it is a confusion to the student and a stumbling-block to the experienced prescriber."

The writer has personally examined the case of a homeopathic physician, consisting of sixteen hundred vials, each containing a remedy different in nature or potency from all the others. Now a system that requires sixteen hundred remedies to treat some thousands of "indications" is certain to have its remedies misapplied by laymen or physi-

cians either, unless they are experts.

It is absurd to say that "if they do no good they will do no harm." If they have no potency, the system is a fraud, and they who recommend it are abettors of fraud. If they have potency, it is for good or ill according as it is wisely or unwisely applied, and the point that I insist upon is, that unwise application is unavoidable in the case of all but experts. Therefore remedies that are harmless are a prime necessity for home treatment of disease.

To add to the certainty that serious results will be likely to occur in the home use of drug medicines is the fact that they are so generally adulterated that no certainty can be had of securing from the ordinary druggist the medicine that is ordered. As an illustration, the New York Pharmaceutical Association reports that "seven samples of nitrous ether varied so greatly that a pint of one only equaled a teaspoonful of another." A manufacturing pharmacist sent fifty prescriptions precisely alike to fifty drug stores. It called for one article that all drug stores are supposed to keep in stock. Analyses showed that only about three of the fifty were correctly put up, and a large proportion of them did not contain a particle of the test medicine.

They who use drugs in home prescriptions are certain

to deal with most uncertain agents.

5. No person who has read the confessions of noted physicians relative to the uncertainty and harmfulness of the ordinary drug treatment of disease can doubt that a better system of cure is one of the most pressing needs of life.

For example, Dr. Sidney Ringer, the greatest English authority on the action of drugs, says: "The sustained administration of alkalies and their carbonates renders the blood *poorer in solids and in red corpuscles*, and impairs the nutrition of the body."

So Dr. Wood, endorsed by Dr. W. L. Stowell, American Medical Bulletin, says: "Present therapeutics is a mixture of science and empiricism." Also Dr. J. J. M. Goss, in Medical Brief, says: "Medicine lacks much of being a fixed science."

6. An over-dose of the remedies of the systems to which the above citations refer produce disturbance of the functions in proportion to the dose.

Official reports from seven European hospitals show under homeopathic treatment a mortality of 4.22 per cent.

Official reports from five European hospitals under allopathic care give a death rate of 12.61 per cent., thus showing the beneficent effects of the least medication as compared with the freer use of drugs, even in the hands of skilled physicians.

The cell-salt remedies if over-dosed or misapplied are simply not appropriated by the absorbents and are carried as waste matter out of the body with no functional disturb-

ance. Therefore they are perfectly safe.

No person who is familiar with the figures showing the enormous sale of patent and proprietary medicines can doubt that the people have taken the work of curing their countless ailments into their own hands. They buy and take blindly because they do not know what better thing to do.

Home treatment doctor books representing all the leading "pathies" have been sold broadcast, yet the people feel that the RIGHT SYSTEM has not come to them vet.

Fortunately, this can be said no longer. The Biochemic System is the most safe, scientific and satisfactory theory and practice of cure that the world has ever seen.

It was not elaborated for the use of the people, and for

thirty years has been kept from them.

This book is the first systematic effort that has ever been made in the English language to adapt the system to the comprehension, and adjust the treatment to the use of those who know nothing of the sciences that are supposed

to be a necessary part of a medical education.

Can it be done? Unquestionably it can, for among the author's own patrons it has been successfully employed in very many instances. And why not? No acquaintance with anatomy, physiology, chemistry, materia medica (medical substances) nor therapeutics (to cure by remedies) is necessary in the home use of the cell-salts.

Names of diseases are entirely ignored, and conditions

only are considered.

These conditions are not some hidden, mysterious things that only a doctor can discriminate, but such as the color of the coat of the tongue, the color and consistency of expectoration or of a discharge, the kind of pain, i. e., shifting or steady, shooting or grinding, etc. Surely these matters any person of ordinary intelligence can determine positively, and with that knowledge he has only to ask this book what salt to use in such conditions, and it answers with a certainty that is as unfailing as human judgment can make it, and is as refreshing as it is sure when compared with the timid, hesitating uncertainty that most people feel in the use of the home doctor books and drug medicines of the past.

This great fact only has but to be stated to show the absolute superiority of this practice over all others, and the

necessity for it, because it is thus superior.

THE PEOPLE OUGHT TO HAVE THE BEST.

CHAPTER II.

THE EFFICIENCY OF THE CELL-SALTS.

There are two methods of determining this question.

The first is the one pursued by patent medicine manu facturers, viz., the collection of *testimonials* from those who as patients have used the nostrums and certify to their value.

The objections to this class of evidence are:

1. The very great liability to *mistake* on the part of those unfamiliar with diseases, and their consequent false report of their real condition.

2. The nearly universal tendency of the human mind to make reports as startling as possible—thus leading to exaggeration.

3. The fact that such testimonies are often *influenced*, sometimes bought outright, and sometimes *transferred* from one article to another.

4. The fact that no nostrum is ever found so poor in virtue that large numbers of testimonials are not offered in its favor.

This item alone should cause the acceptance of such evidence to be considered as a very weak foundation on which to rest the use of compounds affecting human life.

The other method of reaching the truth as to the efficiency of the Cell-Salts is:

To collect testimonials from PHYSICIANS who have prescribed them, and who certify their value in specific conditions to their fellow physicians, whose knowledge of the import of those conditions furnishes a safeguard against undue exaggeration, and who, by the very circumstances in which the testimony is given, can neither be influenced nor bought.

Such evidence from professional men is the strongest that can possibly be adduced outside of a court of justice.

Such is the testimony that is here cited.

These reports are also of peculiar value as detailed examples of the actual use of the remedies in every-day practice, thus furnishing to the intelligent layman hints of the wise selection for the conditions named.

Surely the same remedies for the same conditions can be no less efficient if dealt out by unprofessional hands.

It will be observed that in some cases potences other

than the 6x are employed.

This is well enough for physicians, but as Schuessler advised, the 6x should be the standard, only to be departed from when that obviously fails, not because wrongly selected, but because the system of the patient is incompetent to assimilate it. In most of these cases cited herein there is no evidence that 6x would not have done as well

as the potency actually employed.

The life-long habits of drug dosing have created a timidity in the use of remedies unless specifically prescribed by professional authority on the part of many who rely upon their physicians only, but such need not fear to follow these prescriptions in similar cases; first, because these remedies are not poisonous; second, because these reports are precisely the same kind of authority that physicians follow in making their prescriptions, and the same authority likewise that is relied upon by physicians in writing medical books, and that constitutes the foundation and largely the substance of the lectures to the students in medical colleges.

The names of diseases are retained here both because

they are in the articles cited and to aid the reader in identifying the *conditions* treated under those names. The articles are considerably condensed for this place.

Abscess of Ear.—Carrie A., age 16. Severe pain in left middle ear, with all the symptoms of gathering. Calc. Sulph., 3x, twice a day, cured in two days.—*The Homeo*-

pathic News.

· Accident.-Clara M., 7 years. Thrown and dragged by a horse. Left arm broken above elbow in two places. about three inches apart; left hand badly bruised; right arm and body bruised; hoof-marks on face, right side of which was crushed down; head and neck swollen out an inch; both eyes closed; mouth and tongue badly swollen. I reached her one and a half hours after accident, and found her in death-like stupor. Gave Kali Phos., 3x, every ten minutes, which banished the stupor. Then gave Kali Mur. and Ferrum Phos. alternately every fifteen minutes. Set the arm under chloroform. Second day gave remedies every thirty minutes, and fourth day every hour. Steady improvement from the first, and in three weeks bandages were removed and she was dismissed a well girl. Her life was saved by Ferrum Phos. and Kali Mur. in large doses .- J. C. Ferrell, M. D.

Acute Ailments.—In mostly all acute ailments Ferr. Phos. is absolutely the remedy to begin with, and if rightly and early enough given will cut short the disease. When once exudation or suppuration has taken place, it is no longer the indicated remedy, and we must look farther. Still I would strongly advise the practitioner not to change too quick from Ferrum Phos. to another remedy. Be cautious in this regard.—Ilm. Steinraut, M. D.

AFTER BIRTH, REMOVING.—Young lady, age 27. The labor was normal, but as soon as the child was expelled,

ANAEMIA.—Young lady, age 17. Became greatly debilitated; had no appetite and no ambition; her menses were irregular; absent for months, then a flow varying in quantity. I gave her Calc. Phos., 6x, as principal remedy, also at times Ferrum Phos. as well. A few months and she was able to resume her studies.—Dr. C. T. M.

Anaemia.—Lizzie F., age 16. Almost bloodless, nervous, almost strengthless, been so for months. Cured in five weeks with Calc. Phos., Kali. Phos. and a few doses of Kali. Mur.—Dr. 7. C. Ferrell.

ASTHMA, CHRONIC.—Female, married, age 42. Subject to attacks for years; expectoration greenish and remarkably copious. Natr. Sulph. every three hours. Improvement began after a few doses, expectoration becoming paler and less abundant; has felt better since than for years; and one noteworthy fact is, that the expectoration stopped in a few doses, whereas in previous attacks it had continued for weeks, thus indicating that the Natr. Another Case.—J. W., age 56. Cutting pains in abdomen, bilious stools, coated tongue, yellow eyes and skin, heat in bowels, worse in damp weather. Dr. H. S. Phillips prescribed Nat. Sulph., which resulted in speedy cure.

BITES FROM CENTIPEDE AND SCORPION.—Less than three grains of Nat. Mur. rubbed in with saliva on my little finger relieved me thoroughly in twenty minutes from the effects of the bite of a large centipede (five to six inches).

In scorpion bites, I suggest Ferrum Phos. in addition to Nat. Mur., should Nat. Mur. alone prove insufficient.— Dr. C. V. Lorander.

BLIND SPELLS AND HEADACHE.—Mr. B., engineer, age 59. Blind spells, then flashy lights shooting out in rays and circles from one-half an hour to two hours, then an intense headache. Come from once a day to once in three days. Back head stiff and sore. Troubled five years. I

gave Silica, 12x, and Calc. Flour, 3x, on alternate days, with occasionally Nat. Mur., 3x, and he was cured in three

months .- F. D. Bittinger, M. D.

Bronchitis.—Lady Louisa has been subject to attacks of bronchitis for several winters, the first attack proving very serious. Ferrum Phos., a dose every hour, and a few doses of Kali. Phos. for exhausted condition, were steadily taken for a few days, and then Ferrum Phos. and Kali. Mur. alternately. The doctor who called to see her shortly after stated that the bronchial symptoms were all gone.—Dr.——.

Bronchitis, Chronic.—Archibald Herbert, suffering from chronic bronchitis, had an attack of pneumonia; had been exposed to great heat and took a chill and inflammation of right lung set in; high fever, distressing cough, deep-seated pain in right side, expectoration tenacious, rusty colored. Ferrum Phos. in alternation with Kali. Mur., a dose every half hour, was taken for twenty-four hours; then every hour. As the color of the sputa changed to yellow, he took Kali. CANCER OF THE STOMACH.—Mrs. L., age 63, an Hebrew lady, came under my care suffering with sharp, lancinating pains in the stomach. External examination, cachexia, and all significant symptoms seemed to point to the one condition of cancer. In order to be sure of the diagnosis I took the liberty and precaution to have an examination made by two other physicians in whom I have great confidence, both of whom pronounced it cancer of the stomach, with the prognosis of course of the speedy termination of my patient's life. I remarked that I expected to get her

Oct. 17th. Symptoms all worse; gray spots on both tonsils, and diptheritic odor. Diagnosis: diptheria. Prescribed ten grains each Ferr. Phos. and Kali. Mur., 3x, in two glasses half full of water: a teaspoonful every half

hour, alternately.

Oct. 18th. Great extension of membrane to both tonsils and uvula. Remedies as before, and in addition twenty grains Kali. Mur. in a tumbler of water for gargling every three or four hours.

Oct. 19th. Tonsils and uvula thickly covered with dark, cadaverous-smelling membrane, which had also invaded posterior nares. Gave Ferrum Phos., Kali. Mur. and

Kali. Phos., alternately, every half hour.

Oct. 20th. Hoarse, croupal cough and great difficulty in respiration, showing that membrane had descended into the larynx. Membrane protruding from both nostrils, which exuded a thin excoriating ichor. Total inability to breathe through nose. Patient had several attacks of epistaxis (nose bleed) during night. Unendurable stench from mouth. For the nose bleed I put thirty drops of Crotalus Hor., 10x, in water, and gave a teaspoonful three or four times. Remedies: Kali. Mur., Kali. Phos. and Calc. Phos.

Oct. 21st. Several attacks of nose bleed; no improvement except that there was little fever. Remedies as before. Added to the gargle one-third alcohol. The boy used this freely, as he found it helped breathing.

Oct. 22d. Membrane beginning to soften and peel off from the anterior portion of the tonsils. But little epistaxis

to-day. Continued remedies.

Oct. 23d. Marked improvement; patient spit out large

sloughs of membrane. Continued remedies.

Oct. 24th. Great improvement; no more nose bleed; boy able to breathe a little through left nostril; though he

spit out a great deal of dark membrane, there is still plenty in trachea. Remedies as before.

Oct. 25th. Tonsils, uvula and larvnx, as far as visible. clean; no bleeding of surfaces; both nostrils free; still hoarse and talked with difficulty, but respiration easy. Remedies: Kali. Phos. and Calc. Phos.

Oct. 26th. Patient practically dismissed; when he got up he had paralysis of vocal chords and very great asthenopia, but Kali. Phos., 2 gr. four times a day for a couple

of weeks restored them to the normal condition.

On the fifth day of this boy's sickness his sister, six years old, was taken with the same disease. Ferr. Phos. and Kali. Mur. were all the remedies she took, as her attack was not so violent. I had eight other cases in the immediate neighborhood: none were virulent; all treated and cured with Kali. Mur. and Ferr. Phos. There were quite a number of deaths under "regular" treatment .--Dr. A. C. Davis.

temperature 104, pulse 140. Ferr. Phos., 3x, every hour, and Kali. Mur., 6x, every hour. Two days later kidneys involved. Calc. Phos., 3x, in rotation with the other. Temperature 99, pulse 100, throat nearly clean. Dropped Ferr. Phos. and Calc. Phos. and gave Kali. Mur., 3x, and Nat. Mur., 6x, and the next day discharged the case cured. —S. M. Kessler, M. D.

DISPLACEMENTS, UTERINE.—I have made a specialty of this disease (displacement) for a number of years, and my experience is, that the judicious use of Biochemic remedies, combined with the nightly replacing of the uterus, will give better satisfaction than any other system known.

[His method of replacing is very simple, is accomplished by the patient unaided, and with a slight improvement is as follows, viz., After retiring, take the knee-chest position, i. e., resting on knees with chest on the flat bed, not on pillow, with both hands draw the bowels forward, then insert one forefinger into the vagina and press up against the perineum (the tissue between the vagina and anus) thus filling the vagina with air, which will operate as a cushion or tampon. Then gently lie down on the back if the displacement is forward, on the chest if it is backward, and with the foot of the bed elevated on blocks eight inches if it is downward. Turn to any natural position when tired. Do this every night, and if practicable at a forenoon and afternoon rest also; certainly at one rest time in the day. To strengthen the ligaments, take Calc. Fluor four times a day, and during two to six of the most active hours of the day wear a pledget of cotton saturated with Calc. Fluor—ten doses to the ounce of soft water—pressed up against the uterus and held in place by dry sterilized wool packed in the vagina, but not uncomfortably full.

Calc. Phos. and Kali. Phos., one dose of each one to three times a day in uncomplicated cases, as constitutional and nerve tonics. Other salts if indicated by complications. Keep bowels soft with colon flush of hot water three to seven times a week].

Dysmenorrhea (painful menstruation).—Young lady, age 20, had been troubled every month since puberty with almost unbearable pains in uterus, back and loins, beginning several hours before the flow and continuing two days. The second day hysterical fits came on, and on the third relief from pain. I found her almost mad with pain. Gave Mag. Phos. every ten minutes, and in an hour the pain ceased. Ordered two doses a day for three days. The next month ordered three doses the day before the period and every three hours the first day. Had but slight pain. Repeated the same prescription the third month; no pain, and none since.—Homeopathic World.

DYSMENORRHEA.—Patient in bed, pains seemed unbearable. Had been troubled so every month. I gave Mag. Phos., repeated in half an hour. In a short time she was

EPILEPTIC CONVULSIONS.—A girl about 16 years of age. Convulsions began when menses first appeared, and harder and more frequently in spite of all remedies, until she had them several times a day. Fever, Typho-Malarial.—Wm. H., age 25. Temperature 103.4°, pulse 99. Gave Ferr. Phos. and Kali. Phos. alternately every hour. Third day temperature 103°, pulse 80. Gave the remedies every two hours. Fourth day temperature 101°, pulse 80. Three days later temperature suddenly rose to 103°. Gave the remedies again every hour for three days, when it was under control. Four days later he came to my office as well as ever in his life.—H. G. Merz, M. D.

FEVER, TYPHO-MALARIAL.—Johnnie L., age 8, treated the first week with Baptisia; second week, Ferr. Phos. alternated with Kali. Phos.; fever gone on the twelfth day. HEADACHE.-A lady subject to this affliction. Frequent; worse in damp weather; apt to occur the day after her weekly washing of clothes; comes on gradually in morning and lasts all day. Symptoms: Hard, pressive aching with occasional heat in vertex; markedly better on lying down; vertigo on suddenly turning the head. I administered one dose, a five-grain powder of Calc. Phos., 6x, dry on the tongue, and the headache entirely disappeared in half an hour .- Dr. A. E. Barrett.

HEADACHE.—A rush of blood to the head, with a fiery red face, often vomiting, and is worse on stooping. Ferr.

PERITONITIS AND OVARITIS, CHRONIC (inflammation of ovaries and lining membrane of the abdomen).—Mrs. E., age 38, had suffered thus many years. For a severe aggravation, Dr. G. H. Martin gave Ferr. Phos. every fifteen minutes for two hours, then every hour for several days. She then removed, but after two years has never

had the slightest symptoms of her old trouble.

Wished to die. Many doctors had failed to give relief. Dr. T. E. Williams put her upon Nat. Mur. in the morning, an hour later Kali. Phos. Next hour, Nat. Sulph., and so on in alternation during all waking hours. Nat. Mur. was changed to Mag. Phos. when the lightning-like pains occurred in the head. She was perfectly cured in fifteen weeks.

STOMACH.—Burning in after eating, lasting till next meal time; tongue light gray; no thirst, bad taste nor tenderness; bowels regular; sleep disturbed. Nat. Phos.

STOMACH SICKNESS .- Sudden attacks of deathly sick-

ness, coming on at no particular time, even in sleep, and lasting one-half or one hour; appetite poor. Ferr. Phos. cured, and appetite became ravenous.—Dr. Rane.

STUTTERNG.—A little girl, age four years, just recovered from convulsions, but was left with an impediment in her speech, which grew upon her. Her mother told me it dated from the time when she had the convulsions. I gave her Mag. Phos., 3x, a small dose four times a day, and one dose of Calc. Phos., 6x, in the evening. In three weeks she is entirely free from stuttering, except when excited or angry. I am continuing the remedies and hope to cure completely.—Dr.——

SUMMER COMPLAINT.—Teething children prostrated with vomiting and diarrhea, eyes half closed, inclination to roll the head, are often helped by Mag. Phos. when

other remedies fail .- Dr. Francis McMillan.

Sundry Diseases.—I have used the Tissue Remedies (cell-salts) since 1874. Have had some very severe cases of LaGrippe this winter, but the worst have not lasted longer than one week. One of congestion of langs with hemorrhage. Checked the hemorrhage in six hours, and the patient entirely recovered. Another had been under allopathic treatment four weeks with constant fever. Within three days after I was called her fever left, and at the end of a week she was about the house.—Dr. W. H. Marcan.

Whenever a patient tells me, no matter what the trouble, that his or her backache is relieved by lying on something hard, this remedy is given. In chronic rheumatism of the joints it finds a place. In follicular pharyngitis, especially after our old school neighbors have been swabbing the throat with nitrate of silver, give Nat. Mur. and cure the patient without further delay. Thrush with much salivation, it cures. Blisters, like pearls around the mouth, cracks in the lips, eruptions on the chin very often call for this medicine. In headache it finds a prominent place. The headache is what you might call a hammering headache, generally worse in the morning. Headache of school girls. I use it very much in old nasal and pharyngeal catarrhs with loss of smell and taste, chronic catarrh of bloodless patients. These are but a few of the many conditions in which I have successfully used Nat. Mur. according to Schuessler.

Suppression.—Clara V., age 17. Typhoid fever two months; discharged by physician with total suppression; ankles swollen, perfectly useless and contracting muscles of knees so drawn that the joints formed right angles, and told that she would probably go into consumption. Dr. J. C. Farrell then took the case and gave Kali. Mur., 3x, every hour, and in just seven days her menses came on normally after seven months cessation. He then gave

Calc. Fluor., Calc. Phos., and Kali. Phos., and in two months she could walk ten blocks and back.

SUPPURATIONS.—Young lady, age 16. Right foot fearfully swollen and discharging excessively. The doctors said the foot must be amputated. Knee joint bent at a right angle. The mother reported the case to Dr. Schuessler, who ordered Silica once a day. Three months later the patient walked to see the doctor with foot almost entirely healed.

Another Case.—Orphan girl, age 14. Bone disease of foot. Time fixed for amputation. Dr. M. D. W. ordered Silica every hour and lotion of same on lint. So much improvement in five days that the operation was abandoned, and in a short time she was entirely cured.

SWELLINGS.—L. P. P., face swollen as large as a goose egg on left side. A year before had lost three weeks of time and paid his doctor \$20 for treatment of a jaw injured in that place by the extraction of a tooth. I prescribed Calc. Sulph., three or four tablets every hour, and to stop work and go home. But he continued at work, and three days later reported, "I never saw the like of that in my life. I continued work, but took the medicine every hour, and before 10 o'clock the swelling was going down, and the next morning it was all gone.—Dr. II. S. Phillips.

Syphilis.—Lady, aged 50, with syphilitic ulcers on back and lower half of right leg. The left leg had had ulcers all around it just above the ankle. At this time it had one so deep that splinters of bone have been discharged, and another on which the flesh was hanging loose. The odor was something dreadful. Had suffered a hundred deaths with them. Been treated by every doctor in the county. Could not lie down, and could not sleep, except propped up with pillows. I gave Kali. Phos.,

Ferr. Phos. and Silica for two weeks, when she could lie down and sleep. I then added Calc. Sulph. three times daily. The ulcers on back and right leg are now entirely cured. The flesh on the left leg has become firm and one ulcer healed, and she is well in every way except the remaining ulcer. Will report as to it. To one and all I would say, Try the "Twelve Manner of Fruits" (cell-salts) for the "Healing of the Nations."—Dr. Wm. Mc-Innes.

TAPE-WORM.—A boy, age five years, had spasm, and been treated by several physicians without benefit. After using Nat. Phos. 3x, for six weeks three times a day, he passed four feet three inches of tape-worm, much to the astonishment of all interested. It is believed the entire worm passed, as there was no evidence of any remaining. Nat. Phos. is especially efficient in cases of pinworms.—Dr. A. C. Kimball.

TAPE-WORM.—The characteristics of this case were: Great lassitude in forenoons, very sleepy in the early part of the night, sleep soundly until 4 A. M., when he would be awakened by keen-cutting pain in the bowels and diarrhœa, which would keep up for about three hours, and end in extreme prostration. After eating a little breakfast diarrhœa would cease, and patient would feel better until late in the afternoon, when he would be the same as in the morning. This kept up with great regularity until Nat. Phos., 3x, was taken. The next seance brought with it results in the shape of a twenty-six foot tapeworm, and the commingled emotions of surprise, disgust, and satisfaction of the patient, who had been unable up to that time to diagnose his case. Recovery was rapid.—

TEETHING. -- Child, 18 months old, had cut but two

lower lateral incisors, and the molars of lower and upper jaw. Thin, poorly nourished, "pigeon-breast" chest: hard to learn to walk, general lack of osseous development. Gave Calc. Phos., 3x, three times a day, thirty powders, corrected nourishment. Did not see the case again in three months, when I hardly recognized my scrawny patient, now a strong, healthy child. Had all the incisors, the molars and the "stomach." teeth were beginning to show. Continued treatment as before.

TEETHING—Child, 18 months old; hot skin; cheeks highly flushed; sparkling eyes; pupils dilated, and extreme restlessness and irritability. Ferr. Phos., 6x trit, in water every hour. The first dose had a decided quieting effect, the child going to sleep shortly after taking it, and the cheeks becoming much less flushed. A few repetitions of the remedy entirely removed all the dental

irritation.—Dr. Wilde.

TOOTHACHE, ODONTALGIA.—Lady, face fearfully swollen, no sleep for two nights, great pain. Ordered one grain of Mag. Phos. every half hour. Pain gone in two hours, and the swelling soon subsided.—W. E. Kinnett, M. D.

TOOTHACHE.—A young married lady, severe neuralgia and toothache for several days. Cocaine, morphine and other drugs had all failed, and she was almost crazy with the pain. I gave Mag. Phos. and hot fomentations, but she grew worse. Calc. Phos. gave no better results. I then asked her to try cold water on the tooth, and finding that it mitigated the pain I gave Ferr. Phos. for inflamed nerve, and in half an hour she was asleep, and by continuing the remedy she recovered.—J. B. Chapman, M. D.

Transmitted Disease.—A little girl of three years,

with glands of neck swollen to the size of a hen's egg. Also glands under the arms and in the groins were greatly swollen, and had been more than a year Pale, anæmic, had cut teeth slowly, very constipated. Her mother when pregnant, had incipient consumption, but when the child was born, she was left healthy and strong. I prescribed Calc. Phos. and Silica, and occasionally Calc. Fluor, for the hardness of the glands, and after several months,

she was perfectly cured.—J. B. Chapman, M. D.

Typhlitis (Inflammation of the coecum and vermiform appendix).-Charles M., age 18, found in bed suffering intense pain and vomiting large quantities of greenish substance; pulse 125, with a temperature of 104 F. I found a large tumory swelling situated in the right illiac fossa. It was of a deep, reddish, inflammatory hue, and so tender and sensitive that the patient would hardly allow me to touch the parts. My diagnosis was typhlitis, and well advanced at that. Vomiting was persistent. I placed in a glass two-thirds full of water thirty grains of Nat. Sulph., 3x, and ordered to be given one teaspoonful of the solution until vomiting would be arrested, which took place at 10 P. M., or nine hours after I first saw the patient. I now discontinued Nat. Sulph., and placed the patient on Ferr. Phos. and Kali. Mur., thirty grains of each, dissolved in two separate glasses, two-thirds full of water; gave one teaspoonful alternately every hour. In a few days the swelling began to disappear. The medicine not given as often as before. His recovery in the end was good.—Dr. T. E. Williams.

ULCERATED SORE THROAT.—Symptoms high fever, rapid pulse, pain all over, sore throat with swollen tonsils, and deep, ragged, white ulcers, and very offensive breath. I gave Ferr. Phos. for the fever and inflammatory con-

ditions; Kali. Mur for white tongue and ulcers, and a gargle of the same used frequently. This has been sufficient in all cases to insure a quick recovery. -Dr. J. B.

ULCERATED TOOTH AND GUM BOIL.-Lillie, 6 years old. I gave her about forty doses of Calc. Sulph., 3x, which should have lasted her ten days or more; but she took them all in three days, and was perfectly cured in that time. -M. F. Richards, M. D.

URINATION, FREQUENT AND PAINFUL.—In women, the attacks coming on suddenly, constant urging, with little relief, of nervous origin; I have used Mag. Phos., with most satisfactory results .- Dr. Frances McMillan.

URINE, SUPPRESSION OF .- A man 100 years old, that came under my care. This man had been sixty hours without any water passage. He had taken during the time about six ounces of Nitre, besides a large quantity of melon-seed and cuckleburr tea.

When I was called I used the catheter and drew off a little more than one pint of blood. The next morning I drew off another pint of pure blood. I gave remedies to control the hemorrhage from the kidneys, but it did not stop it. The same day, at night, I drew off another pint. There was also a spasmodic contraction of the neck of the bladder, which I knew would have to be overcome before he could pass anything. The next morning I drew off another pint, making two quarts in all. I prescribed Ferr. Phos., 3x, about four grains in a cupful of water. Of this I directed a teaspoonful every hour. I visited him again at night and the bleeding had all stopped. He was able to pass a few drops of urine. I then changed to Mag. Phos., 3x, and the next morning he could pass water quite freely. Then inflammation of the small intestines set in with watery vomiting. The boweis were swollen very much, and were very tender. Constipation was present, with loss of appetite. I commenced the use of Nat. Mur., 3x, and Kali. Phos., 3x, in alternation every hour. Twelve hours sufficed to control that trouble, and to finish up the case I put him on Kali. Mur., 3x, every two hours. I consider this a remarkable case in view of the age.—Dr. A. K.

URINE, INCONTINENCE OF.—Mrs. M., age 34, suffered from incontinence of urine for three years; origin unknown. Ferr. Phos., 6x, four times a day gave relief in

a week, and cured in four weeks.-Dr.

CHAPTER III.

THE BIOCHEMIC SYSTEM EXPLAINED.

In order to an adequate comprehension of this system of cure, we must know—

What Disease ("not at ease") is.

To disabuse the mind of the reader of the life-long notion that disease is some entity to be expelled or to be killed, is one of the most difficult tasks of Biochemic teachers.

In order to make the subject plain we will premise that there are two, and only two classes of disease. The first is primary, the other secondary. The primary consists of those departures from health which are the immediate result of the lack of a sufficient supply of the organic blood foods, i. e., albumen, sugar and fat, or of the inorganic blood foods, i. e., the twelve cell-salts, or of water or of oxygen.

The lack of any one of these seventeen elements of organic life, to the extent that that deficiency interferes with and prevents its proper function in the animal body, is

primary disease.

The one chief characteristic of all primary disease (by whatever name it may be called in medical books) is that it is *curable* simply by the supply of the deficient element.

The next important characteristic of all primary disease is that it is always liable by bacterial germination or inoc-

ulation to become secondary.

The chief characteristic of secondary disease is, its curability depends upon the two-fold process of *supply* of the *deficient element* and the *destruction* of the *bacterial inva-*

ders by germicides in all cases in which the white blood corpuscles (which are the physiological germicides) are unable to annihilate them.

The objection may be made, that according to this statement hunger and thirst are primary diseases.

The answer is, So they are the instant they reach the extent of disturbance of the functions which food and drink normally sustain. Up to that point they are simply nature's signals for relief before damage is inflicted.

It is very questionable whether there are any diseases that are not first primary and easily curable in that stage, for science has demonstrated that the leucocytes (white blood corpuscles) of perfectly healthy blood have the power to overmaster all forms of bacterial invasion.

Pure blood is that which contains the twelve mineral constituents in the right proportion. MICROBES CANNOT LIVE IN SUCH BLOOD.

The question arises here, naturally, why should deficiency of these salts ever occur? Answer: A failure to procure a sufficient amount of the proper kinds of food cuts the supply of cell salts off at the fountain, or if disease already exists, poor digestion or assimilation may waste even an adequate supply in the food. Again, some great excess of heat or cold, or some sudden and severe electrical change may make an unusual demand upon the blood and partially exhaust its supply too rapidly to be immediately restored by the food. So locally the circulation may be mechanically obstructed and thus have the same effect as if the food were inefficient, or as if digestion and assimilation were defective. Likewise cold. heat, overwork (mental or physical) or exhausting electrical changes may, in a limited area, produce the same result that an overdrain upon the blood does generally. It is with cell life just as it is with water drops turning a wheel, each drop does its work in passing over the wheel then is gone, becomes dead to it, and other drops follow, and the wheel continues to turn by the constant succession of the drops. Suppose that the molecular movements of the water are so changed that it becomes steam, then disturbance occurs at once in the motion of the wheel because it is not adapted to the new form of molecular motion, and is out of harmony with the motive power.

So disease is molecular motion of the cell salts out of harmony with the motive power, i. e., the lite force, because of a diminished quantity of one or more of the cell salts.

It would be just as sensible to sledge off the flanges or buckets of the wheel to cure it, as it is to introduce into the human system agents that do violence to its organism.

All that the wheel wants is water instead of steam. All that the body wants is enough of the cell salts to change their molecular motions into harmony with the life force and evolve new cells according to its own type of creation instead of a lower.

Disease is not therefore an entity, a poison, a something to be killed or expelled by the use of dangerous substances supposed to have an innate hostility to it, in the interests of humanity; it is simply a privation. It is true that after a time chemical products may be formed from the defective vital processes that may have a very positive and harmful effect, but these are results of disease, not disease itself.

Then if effects need attention let them be antidoted upon precisely the same principles that the chemist does in his laboratory, always bearing in mind the different conditions which vitality imposes.

"We no longer should dose man as a zvhole to cure him,

but we should strive to interpret the nature of the cells forming his tissues, their activities, their reactions to drugs and physical treatment, and we should minister to these microscopic individuals or aggregations with a view to increase their natural functions in the prevention of disease, or create activities of this character."—Dr. Paul Paquin.

There are but twelve primary abnormal conditions, though they may be called by a thousand names, and these twelve conditions are cured by the twelve cell salts.

2. What the Cell-Salts are.

If an animal body be burned, the ash that remains is

its indestructible mineral elements.

These are eight in number, viz: Potassa, soda, lime, magnesia, iron, fluorine, sulphur and silica. But in the body—

The *lime* combines with phosphorus, sulphur and fluorine, into three compounds, viz:

rine, into three compounds, viz:

Calcarea Phosphorica—Calcium Phosphate, i. e., Phosphate of lime. Cell-Salt abbreviation, Calc. Phos.

Calcarea Sulphorica—Calcium Sulphate, i. e., Gypsum, Plaster of Paris. Cell-Salt abbreviation, Calc. Sulph.

Calcarea Fluorica=Calcium Fluoride, i. e., Fluoride of lime, Fluor. Spar. Cell-Salt abbreviation, Calc. Fluor.

The potassa combines with phosphorus, sulphur and muriatic acid, into three compounds, viz:

Kali. Phosphoricum=Potassium Phosphate, i. e., Phosphate of potash. Cell Salt abbreviation, Kali. Phos.

Kali. Sulphuricum=Potassium sulphate, i. e., Sulphate

of potash. Cell-Salt abbreviation, Kali. Sulph.

Kali. Muriaticum=Potassium chloride, i. e., Chloride of potash. Cell-Salt abbreviation, Kali. Mur.

The *soda* combines with muriatic acid, phosphorus and sulphur into three compounds, viz:

Natrum Phosphoricum=Sodium phosphate, i. e., Phos-

phate of soda. Cell-Salt abbreviation, Nat. Phos.

Natrum Muriaticum=Sodium Choride, i. e., common salt. Cell-Salt abbreviation, Nat. Mur.

Natrum Sulphurica=Sodium sulphate, i. e., Glauber's salt, sulphate of soda. Cell-Salt abbreviation, Nat. Sulph.

The magnesia combines with phosphorus into one com-

pound, viz:

Magnesia Phosphorica—Magnesium phosphace, i. e., Phosphate of magnesia. Cell-Salt abbreviation, Mag. Phos.

The iron combines with phosphorus into one compound,

viz:

Ferrum Phosphoricum=Ferri phosphas, i. e., Phosphate of iron. Cell-Salt abbreviation, Ferr. Phos.

The silica remains uncombined.

Silica, i. e., Silicious earth, pure flint or quartz. Cell-Salt abbreviation, Silica.

Therefore the Cell-Salts (mode of preparation of which will be explained a little further on) are to supply the deficiencies of these compounds, not merely of their eight mineral bases.

These always exists in certain definite proportions in healthy human blood; therefore they are natural and friendly to the system, while the remedies of all other schools are unfriendly to the body, and it is the effort of nature to expel them that produces their physiological action.

3. The Physiological Properties of the Cell-Salts, and their Particular Functions.

As employed in Biochemic practice, unlike most drug

medicines, they are neither very sweet nor sour, nor bitter, cathartic, diuretic, nor stimulating, but summed up in a single sentence, their properties are assimilative of the organic elements, sugar, fat and albumen.

The body and all its fluids are made of the Cell-Salts and water as inorganic constituents, in combination with the three organic compounds, sugar, fat and albumen.

But, though these may be in close juxtaposition, there can be no body-building without the mysterious life-force to originate and guide the process. This life-force acts upon the Cell-Salts, producing vital molecular movements in them, depending in character upon the quantity of the Salt acted upon, just as a certain number of vibrations of light produce yellow and another number shows as red.

These vital molecular movements reveal themselves as affinities for organic substances. Each Salt has its own particular affinity, one for fat, another for sugar, another for albumen. These affinities thus set in play by the life-force, effect a chemico-vital union of each Salt with its appropriate organic mate, thus forming the cells, which are the base of all animal structures, and the aggregations of which cells make tissue—bone tissue, fat tissue, etc., according to the nature of the Salt employed as the primary worker.

If the quantity of a particular Salt be not sufficient to accomplish the purpose of the life-force, cell-evolution will go on notwithstanding, but on a lower plane, therefore abnormal, because its lower type of organization un-

fits it to perform the functions of the higher.

The functions of the Cell-Salts may be stated more

specifically thus:

CALC. Phos. unites with albumen for the replenishment of connective (glue forming) tissues, blood corpuscles

and the gastric juice, and also particularly of the bones, which consist of the lime which this Salt provides to the extent of 57 per cent. of their substance.

In normal proportions it preserves against anæmia, repairs fractures, secures normal teething, and to some ex-

tent supplies deficiencies of Mag. Phos.

When deficient it permits the easily decomposing albumen to act as a foreign substance in the blood, and be expelled in the expectoration as mucus discharges, or as albumen from the kidneys, or as pimples, or eczema of the skin, or as scrofula. It also causes indigestion; headache with cold feeling in the head; thinness and softness of the skull, delayed closing or reopening of its fontanells (seams); dropsy of the brain; aching eyeballs: nasal polypi; cold in head with thick, tough discharge; rheumatism; various teething disorders; chronic enlargement of the tonsils; constant hoarseness; vomiting after cold drink; prolapsus; cough, with expectoration of albuminous, white mucus; curvature of the spine; numb, cold limbs; bow-legs; bone abscesses; paralysis with creeping numbness and coldness; rickets; night sweats in consumptions, etc.

Its chief characteristics are: Worse by cold, motion, change of weather and getting wet; better by rest, warmth

and lying down.

CALC. SULPH. carries waste matters from the system by the organs of excretion, i. e., skin, lungs, kidneys and bowels.

When in normal proportion it restrains suppurative processes and heals suppurations by removing their exciting causes.

When deficient, it permits the epithelial cells to disintegrate and with the wastes to be cast out as discharges or suppurations of a yellow, purulent character, or as crusts of the same, as in the third stages of all catarrhs, lung troubles, boils, carbuncles, ulcers or abscesses; suppurations of the head, eyes, ears, nose; watery pimples on face; ulcers of teeth, mouth, tongue, throat; diarrhea, dysentery with pus-like discharges; chronic inflammation of bladder; suppuration of the breast or joints; all wounds in the suppurative stage; all cases of suppuration when the discharges continue too long and the sore is unhealthy.

Its chief characteristics are: Worse by getting wet, or by washing or working in water; also, the discharge of

pus with an open vent.

CALC. FLUOR. builds the elastic fiber of the muscles, skin, connective (glue-forming) tissue and walls of the blood vessels out of albumen, water and oxygen. (Albumen is a compound of protein, sulphur and phosphorus. Protein is a compound of nitrogen, carbon, hydrogen and oxygen).

Calc. Fluor. also controls the formation of the surface

of bones and the enamel of teeth.

In normal proportions it therefore preserves the elastic fibers intact, and in concert with Ferr. Phos. as an ele-

ment of tonicity, secures their vigorous action.

When deficient, the elastic fibers sag, and varicose veins, vascular tumors, hemorrhoids (piles), prolapsus, etc., occur; or if an elastic fiber or lime exudation finds place in the connective tissue or the glandular system, it cannot be absorbed because of the deficient action of the minute blood vessels and swelling supervenes.

Its deficiency also gives an unhealthy condition to the surface of the bones and the enamel of the teeth; also causes tumors on the heads of young infants; cataract of the eye; diseases of the bones of the ear, or of the nose. or jaw; also stuffy cold in the head with thick, yellow, lumpish, greenish discharge; also makes the teeth very brittle, or loose in their sockets, or the enamel rough; also gives cracked tongue; elongation of palate; piles; displacements; coughs with tiny lumps of tough yellow mucus; varicose veins; chapped skin; skin hard and horny; hard swellings; dropsy from heart disease, etc.

Its chief characteristics are: Worse in damp weather, better generally by hot applications in hardened conditions, and by cold when contraction is required; also relieved by fomentation and by rubbing. It is complementary with Silica; should be used when Silica is indicated, but fails

to complete the cure.

FERR. Phos. is a constituent of the blood corpuscles for the double purpose of furnishing iron to the muscle-cells

and of carrying oxygen to those cells.

When in normal proportions it preserves the tone of the circular fibers of the blood vessels, and thus prevents varicose veins and hemorrhage; preserves the muscles of the intestinal villi (absorbents) from relaxation and consequent loose evacuations; prevents the muscles of the intestinal walls from weakening, thereby causing their vermicular (worm-like) action to diminish and constipation to set in; gives contractility to the blood vessels that are overcharged in congestions, so that the irritation is removed; and furnishes oxygen for the reconstructive process of cell building, whether of the healing of fresh wounds or replacement of worn out tissue.

When deficient, the circulation increases in the effort to make the part do the oxygen carrying work of the whole, which more rapid circulation generates too much heat (fever) which causes a deficiency in potassium chloride, and as this salt works with fibrin, that cannot all be built into tissues, consequently remains as a foreign agent in the blood to be thrown off through the lungs by expectoration, or remaining in the lung inflames it into pneumonia, or is expelled through the nasal membrane as catarrh (Carey); also causes rush of blood to the head, headache, vertigo; inflammation of the eyes, ears, mouth, tongue, throat, stomach, lungs, bladder and other pelvic organs; and hemorrhage of bright red blood, anaemia, etc.

Its chief characteristics are: Always aggravated by mo-

tion and relieved by cold.

KALI, MUR. finds in the blood certain albuminoids (nitrogenous substances) with which it unites and forms fibrine (blood-clot). (Carey).

Its function therefore is to change the nitrogenous element of food into flesh, because fibrine is flesh as yet in

a liquid medium.

Prof. Stockois, at the last Medical Congress, at Rome, declared that "It can be chemically demonstrated that Kali. Mur. can both bind two atoms of oxygen and form ozone, and under different conditions of the system it can break up the ozone and thus make two atoms of oxygen available for the processes of life." What is this but practical storage of oxygen for emergencies?

In normal proportions it preserves muscular weight and

vigor.

When deficient, the unused fibrinous elements are cast out in the form of fibrinous exudations, such as the false membranes of croups, diphthevia and dysentery, and the serous exudations containing fibrine in acute inflammations of the pleura and peritoneum, and in the thick white discharges from mucus membranes, and in the white con-

tents of skin eruptions and the flour-like scales on the skin.

The same material, failing to be organized into tissues, causes soft infiltrations (swellings), headaches with thick white coating on tongue; thick white discharges from the eyes, ears, nose; cankered mouth; gum-boils; ulcerated sore throat; gastritis (inflammation of stomach), second stage; sluggish liver, with constipation; diarrhea, with pale yellow or gray-colored stools; all thick, milky white, non-irritating mucus discharges; rheumatism with swelling; chronic swelling of feet and legs; epilepsy; blistering ervsipelas; glandular swellings, etc.

Its chief characteristics are: Generally worse from motion; if in stomach or abdomen worse from pastry, rich or

fatty foods; also from a highly albuminous diet.

Kall. Phos. makes the gray matter of the brain out of albumen, sugar, oil, water and oxygen. It is also a constituent of the brain, the nerves, the muscles and the blood-corpuscles.

Existing in normal proportions it maintains mental and nervous strength, and properly innervates (i. e., supplies

with nerve strength) all parts of the organism.

When deficient it may cause any disease that will naturally result from deficiency of brain and nerve power; and of course aggravate all diseases caused by the lack of other Cell-Salts. The range of its action, therefore, is almost universal.

Its chief characteristics are: Worse by noise, by rising from a silting position; by mental or physical exertion, and in cold air. Better by gentle motion, eating, excitement, or any gentle, pleasing, mental occupation.

KALI. SULPH. carries organic matter—i. e., oil, sugar and albumen, especially oil—to the cells of the skin and

mucous membranes, and thus vitalizes the tissues of the pores.

When in normal proportions it keeps open the 7,000,000 pores of the skin, which are constantly throwing off

the wastes of the system.

When deficient, the skin not receiving a proper amount of oil, the pores schrivel, the excretion of waste matters through them is suppressed, and the blood thereby becomes poisoned.

Its chief characteristics are: Worse in warm room and toward evening; better in cool, open air; yellow mucous discharges; always applicable in third stage of inflamma-

tion.

Mag. Phos. forms out of water, albumen and oxygen, the transparent fluid that nourishes and governs the delicate nerve-threads called white fibers.

In normal proportions it preserves muscular tissues from

undue or spasmodic contraction.

As compared with Kali. Phos., the function of which is to supply the stimulus for contraction, Mag. Phos. acts as a regulator.

When deficient, spasmodic action is set up in the form

of cramps, jerks, and spasmodic pains.

As compared with Ferrum Phos., a deficiency of which produces muscular relaxation, the deficiency of Mag. Phos. produces undue contractility, hence come twitchings, lockjaw, convulsions, choking on attempt to swallow, squinting, sharp neuralgic pains, spasmodic stammering, griping, indigestion, painful urination, dysmenorrhea, convulsive coughing, nervous chills with chattering teeth, yawning with straining of lower jaw, etc., which are all Nature's cry for more Mag. Phos.

Its chief characteristics are, as an antispasmodic: Worse

on right side from cold, cold air, washing in cold water and from touch. Better by warmth, pressure, friction and

bending double.

NAT. Mur. distributes water in right proportions to all parts of the system. About 70 per cent. of our bodies consists of water, which would be distributed only in obedience to the laws of gravitation, the propulsion of the circulation and the permeability of tissues by fluids, were it not for Nat. Mur. This Salt uses the water both to build up tissue and to carry off wastes, and as these double processes go on continuously in every part, its importance can scarcely be overestimated.

In normal proportions it gives to all the excretions and secretions a proper degree of moisture or fluidity, and

maintains the same in all the structures.

When deficient, there will be a decrease of secretions, or greater dryness of excretions, or two little water in the tissues; as in sunstroke drying the base of the brain; delirium tremens drying the brain substance; delirium with tongue either frothy or dry and parched; headaches; melancholia, hopelessness, despondence with constipation and watery symptoms elsewhere; loss of smell from dryness of the nose; low fevers with dryness of tongue; constipation with dry stools; dry coughs and dry skin.

On the other hand, the deficiency of Nat. Mur. may occasion increase of secretions, e. g., saliva or tears, or an increase of water in the tissues, e. g., dropsy; also neuralgic pains in eyes; fresh colds, with free discharge of water from the nostrils; vomiting of clear mucus; salivation; catarrhs with transparent watery discharge; diarrhea with watery stools; excessive urination; asthma; bronchitis with frothy, watery mucus; palpitation of the

heart with dropsical swellings; watery skin eruptions; excessive sleep from too much moisture in the brain, etc.

Its chief characteristics are: Worse in morning, cold

weather and salty air; better in evening.

NAT. Phos. splits up the lactic acid formed in the process of digestion into carbonic acid and water; also combines with acid into new compounds. The importance of this salt is shown by the fact stated by Bernard, that a very weak solution of acetic or lactic acid injected directly into the blood will cause death even before it is neutralized by the alkali in the blood.

In normal proportions it gives the alkaline quality to blood and saliva by neutralizing the excess of acid that would otherwise exist from the fact that the creation of acid is an organic process and is never deficient, if a suffi-

cient amount of proper food is taken.

When deficient, it causes all diseases that spring from excess of acidity, e. g., inflammation of eyes with creamy discharge; acidity of the stomach; sore throat with creamy coating; false diphtheria; morning sickness with vomiting of sour fluid; ulceration of stomach with creamy yellow coating on tongue; diarrhea with green, sour smelling stools; inability to retain urine; trembling about the heart after eating; rheumatic pains with sour smelling perspiration: skin diseases with creamy yellow secretion; diabetes, etc.

Characteristic indications are: A moist, thick, goldenyellow coating on the tongue and palate, and acidity.

NAT. SULPH. eliminates excess of water from the blood and tissues, and preserves the bile in normal consistency.

In normal proportions it prevents the accumulation in the tissues of the water that is formed by their constant oxydation; also prevents excessive accumulation in the blood of the water that is held in solution by the air of respiration; also prevents the accumulation in the digestive tract of the water formed by the decomposition of lactic acid.

(Carey).

When deficient, excess of water accumulates in the blood and causes chills; the bile thickens, clogs the ducts, and produces biliousness, vertigo, yellow eyes and skin; bad taste in mouth; dirty greenish gray or greenish brown tongue, or a white or gray coated tongue; diarrhea with dark greenish stools; diabetes; brick dust urine; rheumatism with bilious symptoms; lassitude; consumption with yellow watery and green expectoration, etc.

As related to Natrum Mur., which carries water into and distributes it in proper quantities through the system, Nat. Sulph. carries it out of the tissues into the excretory chan-

nels.

Its chief characteristics are: Worse by use of water in any form, in damp weather, in the morning, and by lying on left side; better in warm, dry weather, and in open air.

Silica mechanically promotes suppuration by the lancet-like action of its infinitesimal crystals, and is an electrical conductor for the gray matter of the brain. (Carey). It is a component part of the connective tissue, the epidermis, the hair and the nails.

In normal proportions it affects the brain, spinal marrow and nerves favorably through the connective tissue cover-

ing of the nerve fibers.

When deficient, it causes swelling of the connective tissue cells which may go on to suppuration, as in boils, fclons, carbuncles, suppuration of glands, joints, cornea of the eye, and the like. It may also render the connective tissue of the brain so negative that thought becomes difficult and despondency or headache supervene, etc.

Its chief characteristics are: Worse at night, during full moon, from chilling feet and in open air; better by heat and in warm room.

An important fact to be noted just here is the COMPENSATIVE FUNCTION of these salts, i. e., by reason of their chemical affinities if one salt becomes deficient, it may be reinforced by drawing upon another that is chemically related to it, e. g., when excess of brain work or worry has reduced the supply of Kali. Phos. it may be measurably substitutionally provided by the other phosphate salts, viz., Calc. Phos., Mag. Phos. and Nat. Phos.; but that supply is inferior for the use of the brain, besides exhausting the stock of the substituted salt to such an extent as to interfere with its appropriate work.

This explains how, by a sort of patch-work compensation, one can live for many years notwithstanding the presence of what would otherwise be a fatal deficiency in a particular salt, yet never really recover health, because Nature's effort to run the machine in spite of the defect entails other deficiencies that in turn may find other substitutions, and so on, until nearly every salt has become insuf-

ficient.

This also explains why the supply of the chief deficiency only so often fails to cure, i. e., because the other needs are not met. A balloon may have one main leak and five smaller ones, all of which together render it impossible to expand it, because they let off the gas as fast as it can be supplied.

The largest leak may then be stopped, but still complete expansion can never be had and a safe ascent secured until all the other five are mended. So with the Cell-Salts. If one is at hard work, as well try to sustain the energies of the system by eating sugar alone, as to keep up the nor-

mal health upon one or even eleven of these necessary elements of organic life; the machine is designed to work perfectly on twelve, and all of them must be provided, for Nature cannot be defrauded with impunity, nor can she work her best on any other plan than her chosen one.

The importance of the separate functions of the several salts will be fully seen when their use in the cure of dis-

ease comes to be considered.

4. How the Cell-Salts Cure Disease.

Simply by supplying the lack.

The fever-pangs of excessive thirst need only water to be assuaged.

The agonies of starvation require only rest and food to be subdued.

The obtuse mentality and sluggish action of the vital organs in deficient oxydation call only for that life-inspir-

ing element.

So, whatever the particular phase of primary disease may be, resulting from a deficiency of a single Cell-Salt, the one only call that its symptoms make, is for the inorganic food for the lack of which the blood is starving.

For example: Kali. Sulph, has been deficient until an eczema with dry itching skin is telling that the skin lacks

its proper nourishment.

To other schools of medicine that voice calls for nerve-quieting unguents and bacterial destroyers. If these remedies chance to contain the element for lack of which the skin is suffering, they may cure by virtue of that element; but most likely they do not, and the disease goes on.

To the Biochemist that voice simply says, "Give me Kali. Sulph."; and it is done; and if the disease is yet in its primary stage, its vitalizing influence cures at once. If

it has reached the secondary stage, he must run the same chance of selecting the right germicide that others do, with still this great advantage in his favor: he supplies the need for nutriment at the same time that he seeks to

destroy the germs which perpetuate the trouble.

Take another illustration: Kali. Mur. is deficient: because of it, the albuminous element in the blood which should be made into fibrine (lean flesh) cannot be, because it is the special function of Kali. Mur. to effect that transformation. The albumen is chemically too unstable to go floating long in the moist; warm blood-current without putrefaction; therefore, as soon as it fails to be built into tissue it becomes a source of peril, hence wise Nature seeks to cast it forth as waste material before it can do serious damage.

If there is not oxygen enough to change it into urea and expel it through the kidneys, or if there is a local irritation of the throat determining the blood to that locality, Nature will cast it off through the mucous membrane as an exudation which by infection may become almost in-

stantly croup or diphtheria.

Supply the needed Salt and the albumen in the blood is at once assimilated, and of necessity the exudation must

cease for want of material.

The seeming mystery of cures by such simple means should now be explained.

Science has shown that the nearer the primary atomic form of matter any substance can be found, the more it becomes capable of penetrating other bodies. Hence the ether that fills space, as undoubtedly the nearest to atomic existence of any known substance, has a penetrating power that nothing can resist as proved by the recent discovery

of the telegraphic ray, so much more potent than the X-ray.

The crude Salts are always in molecular, i. e., aggre-

gated form.

The more they are triturated, the more they approach, though probably they never reach the atomic condition.

It is therefore perfectly clear that triturations or dilutions from triturations are the only proper form for remedial use.

Trituration consists in rubbing a Cell-Salt in a mortar less than one to six hours with nine times its weight of sugar of milk, which is selected to be the vehicle for the administration of the Salt, because it is harmless, pleasant to the taste, occasions no chemical change in any of the Salts, and is itself an element of the living organism.

This makes the first trituration or potency, and is ex-

pressed by the sign, if any be used, Ix.

The second trituration or potency (the words mean the same thing as far as relative proportions of the Salt and its vehicle go, but trituration is confined exclusively to the powder or tablet form, while potency applies to liquids and powders) is made, not by mixing one part of the mineral Salt directly with 99 parts of the sugar of milk but by taking one part of the 1x and rubbing that with 99 parts of the sugar of milk one to six hours more.

The difference in effect is very great. If the Salt were used by direct mixture for the second potency (trituration, 2x), then it would have but the same degree of comminution or breaking up into greater fineness as the 1x, whereas by taking the one part of the 1x of which to make the 2x.

it undergoes double the amount of friction.

The rapid diminution of the relative proportion of the

mineral salt to that of its vehicle (sugar of milk) is seen by this statement, viz., the Ix is salt one-tenth grain to sugar of milk nine-tenths of a grain.

The 2x = salt 1-100 of a grain to 99-100 of its vehicle.

The 3x = salt I-I,000 of a grain to 999-I,000 of its vehicle.

The 4x =salt 1-10,000 of a grain to 9,999-10,000 of its vehicle.

The 5x = salt 1-100,000 of a grain to 99,999-100,000 of its vehicle.

The 6x = salt 1-1,000,000 of a grain to 999,999-1,000,000 of its vehicle.

The 7x = salt 1-10,000,000 of a grain to 9,999,999-10,000,000 of its vehicle.

The 8x = salt 1-100,000,000 of a grain to 99,999,999-100,000,000 of its vehicle.

The gx = salt I-I,000,000,000 of a grain to 999,999,-

The IOX = salt I-IO,000,000,000 of a grain to 9,999,999,999-IO,000,000,000 of its vehicle, and so on to the desired potency, if any higher be deemed advisable.

The thought naturally arises, how can such infinitesimal quantities of any food such as is represented by the 6x have any effect whatever upon the vital processes?

The answer may be found in the following facts, viz:

Scientists estimate that one milligramme (i.e., the thousandth part of a French gramme, which gramme equals 15.438 grains troy, the 1-1,000 part of which is .0154 of one troy grain) of any substance contains sixteen trillions (16,000,000,000,000,000,000) of the ultimate molecules of that substance, or 2,464,000,000,000,000 molecules to each troy grain.

The 6x salt contains in one grain one-millionth of a grain of the salt, i. e., 2,464,000,000 of its atoms. As the dose consists of three grains, there are therefore in each dose of the 6x, 7,392,000,000 atoms—a respectable number certainly.

But this alone does not meet the question. We must know also, at least to a reasonable degree of probability, how many atoms are requisite to supply deficiency. This in turn must depend upon the amount of the deficiency.

This raises the question of dosage.

It would add greatly to exact knowledge concerning it if we could know precisely the line of demarkation between the physiological hunger for a deficient salt, and the pathological disease indications that the hunger has not been satisfied. It is altogether probable that a certain definite percentage of waste beyond supply is that line, but experiments have never settled it, even if they have been attempted.

Knowing the quantity of the salt, and assuming a proportionate waste, if we knew the percentage which makes the line between salt-hunger and disease from lack of the salt, we could calculate accurately the amount to be sup-

plied, and the dosage would then be very simple.

In our ignorance of that we can only show by a mathematical process the certainty of being able to supply all

probable deficiency.

On the fair assumption that the infant appropriates all the iron each day that its one quart of milk food contains, i. e., one milligram to each half pint, there are supplied to its 4,115 drops of blood each day 8,333,333,333 molecules of iron or 347,222,222 each hour, which is 86,809 atoms to every drop of blood, or 357,219,035 atoms at any one hour. The same milk contains but one-billionth of a grain

of fluorine, while of the iron there is six-millionths of a grain.

It is fair to assume that the reduction in ordinary food from the working to the bare subsistence standpoint represents all the privation that the system can endure without detriment. This is 48 per cent. Anything below must be disease-producing. This per cent is equivalent to the loss of 171,466,136 atoms, which would be supplied by one-forty-second part of a three-grain dose of the Ferrum Phos.

Now if the loss in any disease be even forty-two times greater than the diminution from the work to the subsistence standpoint, even then a single three-grain dose would supply the deficiency. This proves conclusively that the infinitesimal quantities of the 6x are abundant to supply the losses which produce disease.

osses which produce disease.

As further illustrations of the power of infinitesimals:

The one-thouasndth part of a grain of strychnia will produce tetanus in frogs.—Dr. Arnold, of Heidelberg.

He has seen this result repeatedly from one-millionth of

a grain .- Hygieia, Vol. X, p. 56.

Professor Stokvis, in an address given at the Medical Congress in Rome; made use of the following example: "If we throw metallic copper into water and wait for some days, we shall find that a certain proportion of the copper has dissolved, i. e., one part to seventy-seven million parts of water" (about one drop to three barrels of water), and Dr. Walker adds: "Drinking such water may produce vomiting, diarrhea, etc."

Spallanzani fertilized a frog's egg with 1-2,984,687,500

part of a grain of the seminal fluid of frogs.

It has been estimated that a cubic inch would contain 125 sextillions of bacteria or, in other words, 125 followed by twenty-one cyphers. Yet each one is a living thing.

Let us take another view: Analyses show that three and a half ounces of blood cells contain normally the mineral constituents in these proportions, viz.: Iron phos., 0.998; potass. sulph., 0.132; potass. chloride, 3.079; potass. phos., 2.343; sodium phos., 0.633; sodium chloride, 0.344; calcium phos., 0.094; mag. phos, 0.060, which stated relatively to each other in percentages is, iron phos., 12.98; potass sulph., 1.71; potass. chloride, 40.07; potass. phos., 30.50; sod. phos. 8.23; sod. chlor., 4.47; cal. phos., 1.22; mag. phos., 78.

The ascertained waste of all the Cell-Salts is about one ounce every 24 hours. The average is 8-10 of an ounce, or 384 grains, which is 16 grains per hour, or a total of

256,000,000,000,000 atoms each hour.

These, distributed according to the proportions existing in the system would give as the normal loss per hour:

Ferr. phos.......33,280,000,000,000 Atoms.
Pot. sulph......4,352,000,000,000
Pot. chor......102,400,000,000,000
Pot. phos.......78,080,000,000,000
Sod. phos......21,120,000,000,000
Sod. chlor.....11,520,000,000,000
Cal. phos......3,072,000,000,000
Mag. phos.....2,048,000,000,000

Nearly all diseases are local in their origin, i. e., when from lack of iron congestion begins, not over one thou-

sandth part of the body is involved at first.

The thousandth part of the iron molecules in the body equal 33,280,000,000, the deficiency of which, if estimated at 10 per cent. below the difference between working and subsistence diet (which is 48 per cent.) would be 1,597,440,000 molecules, which would be replaced by 2-10 of one dose of Ferr. Phos.

The above showing of the relative wastes of the Salts, very strongly suggests the propriety of dosing them relatively somewhat in proportion to their probable loss, but more investigation is needed in this direction.

But the objector says: "Certainly the higher potencies, the two hundredth for example, can contain no drug, it must be trituated all away." Answer: Doubtless, this is true of organic substances, but cannot be of the indestructible inorganic Salts, for what fire cannot burn away, the mortar cannot triturate away.

True, Dr. D., in the *Homeopathic News*, says, that "it disappears in the eighteenth trituration." Whether this be true or not, abstractly considered, as a practical element, it is doubtful whether it exists beyond the tenth, although there is satisfactory evidence to show that *something* cures even in much higher potencies.

There are supposed to be more than 1,200 million cells in the brain and spinal cord alone, each cell built up by these wonderful processes of Cell-Salt action.

The life of a blood corpuscle is supposed to be about six weeks. What that of other tissue cells is we know not, but these amazing changes going on continuously without a break through life show to the reflective mind the boundlessness of the wisdom that planned the structure, and the ceaseless watchfulness and power of the Providence that secures its perpetuity.

CHAPTER IV.

THE INDICATIONS OR SYMPTOMS THAT CALL FOR THE USE OF EACH CELL-

Under many symptoms two or more remedies are named. When this is the case, the one should be employed whose physiological properties as given in chapter III best agree with the particular help that nature needs, e. g., boils, Ferr. Phos., Kali. Mur., Calc. Sulph., Silica.

When heat and pain indicate congestion, Ferr. Phos.

When swelling sets in, Kali. Mur.

To prevent suppuration, Calc. Sulph.

This proving unavailing, to hasten suppuration, Silica. Hence the practical rule should be: When two or more Salts are named for one symptom, give the one most strongly indicated, and if that fails, the next, and so on

successively, or in alternation.

The following Combination Table is taken from Dr. Walker's work, and was prepared by Professor Carnelly, an eminent doctor of science, and is believed to be very accurate. For the sake of brevity numbers are attached instead of the names of the Salts:

No. 1. Calcium Phosphate may be combined (taken

with) with Nos. 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, 10 and 12.

No. 2. Calcium Sulphate with Nos. 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11 and 12.

No. 3. Calcium Fluoride with Nos. 1, 2, 5, 9 and 12.

No. 4 Ferric Phosphate with Nos. 1, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12.

No. 5. Potassium Chloride with Nos. 1, 3, 4, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 12.

No. 6. Potassium Phosphate with Nos. 1, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10 and 12.

No. 7. Potassium Sulphate with Nos. 2, 5, 6, 8, 11 and 12.

No. 8. Magnesium Phosphate with Nos. 1, 4, 6,7, 9, 10, 11 and 12.

No. 9. Sodium Chloride with Nos. 1, 3, 5, 8, 10, 11 and 12.

No. 10. Sodium Phosphate with Nos. 1, 4, 6, 8, 9, 11 and 12.

No. 11. Sodium Sulphate with Nos. 2, 7, 8, 9, 10 and 12.

No. 12. Silica with all.

It will be noticed that the *phosphates* combine with each other; so, also, do the *sulphates*, and the *chlorides* and *fluorides*, while *silica* combines with all.

Do not forget that the special locality of the trouble is of no account in selecting a remedy only as it affords an opportunity for a symptom to be revealed, i. e., congestion whether in eye, throat, stomach, bowels, kidney, bladder or foot, calls for Ferr. Phos.; and so of all the Salts—they are all constitutional, not local merely.

Dosage.—While making the suggestion on a previous page of the advisability of dosing the Salts somewhat according to their relative waste within a specified time, it is deemed best to adhere in this book to the customary three grain dosage, to be administered one to four times a day in chronic cases, and from once in ten minutes to once in two hours in acute cases, being governed by the violence of the symptoms.

Mag. Phos. should usually be given in hot water in acute cases.

All the other Salts should be also when a very speedy effect is desired.

When more convenient, the tablets or powder may be dissolved in water and given in spoonful doses, being careful to dissolve three grains for every teaspoonful prepared.

Tablets of this size are one grain.

Tablets of this size are three grains.

The Salts may be advantageously employed externally whenever so prescribed by dissolving one dose of the Salt to every teaspoonful of water used for the lotion.

Apply with a compress, and cover to prevent too rapid

evaporation.

The powder, or tablets pulverized, may also be made into an *ointment* with olive oil or vaseline and used in ap-

propriate cases.

No classification can be made that will not contain the same symptom, under different divisions, and thus duplicate the symptoms, e. g., neuralgia in the head, would naturally be found under head, nerves and pain, but in this book, the first principle of classification being the functions and the second the organs, it will fall under Pain, and if not found there, under the organs, i. e., Nerves, instead of in all three places, and thus save expense.

SECTION I—CIRCULATION.

The function of circulation is:

CHAPTER V.

NATURE'S CO-OPERATIVE CURATIVES.

DIET.

The influence of material substances upon the brain is strikingly illustrated by the statement, that the Arabs manipulate their hasheesh so that there are some establishments where the peculiar quality is sold that makes a man sing, and others where the effect is to produce continuous laughter, while another preparation causes visions, either of a delightful or a horrible character, according to the quantity; and when the drug is taken at a certain strength, the fiercest and most self-ignoring homicidal tendency is developed, whence the derivation of the word "assassin" from hasheesh. The medical superintendent of an insane asylum affirmed his ability to change the mental condition of his patients in a similar way, solely by changing their diet.

The diet question, therefore, is one of supreme importance, by which is not meant either oatmeal hobbyism, vegetarian exclusiveness, nor the asceticism which denies a good thing because it pleases the palate.

It starts with the proved facts, that human foods are divisible into four groups, called respectively, protein (i. e., albuminous or nitrogenous), fats (meat and fish fat, butter, vegetable oils), carbohydrates (C. H. O., corn-starch, sugar, gums, jellies and fruit acids), and mineral salts. Each group has its own work to perform, like four mechanics

building and running an intricate machine.

Mr. Protein is a man of all trades, and can do his own appropriate work or that of either Mr. Olleum or Mr. Carbo, but not the work of Mr. Salts. Mr. Olleum and Mr. Carbo can either of them do the work of the other, but not the work of Mr. Salts or Mr. Protein. Mr. Salts can do his own work only. It is evident, therefore, if there is to be any material deficiency in the service of these men, it is better that it should be in that of Mr. Olleum or Mr. Carbo, because there will then be a better chance to have it supplied by the others. It is further evident that any deficiency in the work of either Mr. Protein or Mr. Salts must remain unsupplied. It so happens that their work is not only of relatively greater importance than the other two, but is absolutely necessary, while that of the other two can be dispensed with to a certain extent.

Mr. Protein furnishes nearly all the frame work, the

ropes, pulleys, etc.

Mr. Salts fits the parts to each other in working order. Mr. Olleum and Mr. Carbo furnish fuel and padding.

Now, it is easy to see that if the frame work is defective, or the parts not properly adjusted to each other, the defect is very serious, while a limited lack of fuel or padding can

be supplied by Mr. Protein.

Scientific investigations have settled the relative amounts of the different groups of food elements as (when estimated dry), protein 4.2, fats 1.8, C. H. O. 18. salts \(\frac{3}{4}\) ounce, needed every twenty-four hours for a man at moderate work.

Females require two-tenths less in the same circumstances.

The amount of force generated by this food in the same time, expressed as heat, is 3,500 calories, a calory being the amount of heat that will raise one pound of water 4° F.

The proteids are albuminoids, i. e., nitrogenized substances, represented in the blood by fibrin or liquid flesh, chemically the same as the white of egg and the gluten of wheat. If, then, these are deficient the tissues waste, the gastric fluid is impaired, and the nerves lose their tone. When the fats and C. H. O. are deficient the working force and resisting power of the system against cold both diminish. When the salts are deficient the material provided cannot be built together into the machine.

In disease one or more of the functions of these food elements are disturbed, e. g., in consumption, marasmus, malnutrition, and fevers, the tissues waste for want of protein. In long-continuud abstinence the fats that are stored in the system are burned as fuel, as in the case of the hibernating period of the bear, who retires in the fall sleek and fat, but wakes in the spring lank and ravenous, having consumed his stock of fat-fuel.

The fats are also stored in the system as cushions for the mechanical machinery as well as a reservoir of fuel for fu-

ture emergency.

The C. H. O. group consists of starches and sugars. Sugars consist of cane or table sugar, grape or fruit sugar, and milk sugar. The last two are ready for immediate absorption, but the cane sugar must be digested.

It is the misfortune of the people that modern cookery provides a large excess of fats, starches and sugars, and a corresponding deficiency of proteids and salts. The result is that the sugars and starches are first consumed in the system, using up the oxygen of respiration and that contained in food and drink to such an extent that there is not enough left with which to transform the proteids into tissue, thus leaving in the warm blood current the easily decomposing nitrogenous substance, which becomes an immediate and constant source of disease.

A further result is a deficiency of the protein element,

with its consequences as above stated.

Little more can be done in this book than to enunciate the general principles of the subject, and this can best be done in the form of separate statements without regard to direct logical connection.

Some eat themselves into disease by an over supply of nutriment. Hundreds of thousands do the same thing by

the use of food disproportioned in its elements.

Thousands upon thousands slip from acute disease into

I housands upon thousands slip from acute disease into chronic invalidism by semi-starvation, in which the stomach shrinks to the insufficient supply and becomes incapable of handling an adequate amount.

A certain amount of oxygen is absolutely essential to the digestion of a given amount of food, i. e., the oxygen obtained from the inspiration of seventeen cubic inches of air

for each ounce of food.

Therefore, if the respiratory power is diminished, as in consumption or from any other cause, the food must be

reduced to a corresponding degree.

If the food consumed is insufficient to maintain the strength, yet is all that can be digested with existing respiratory capacity, then the remedy lies not in digestants nor tonics, but in *increased respirations*.

It is seldom that the nutritive needs of a person in sickness can be met from the ordinary table fare of the family.

If the disease be in the stomach, the proteids that are allowed should be in fluid form and the main dependence for nutrition should be placed upon the fluid proteids and the fats and starches. In severe cases enemas of fluid proteids are necessary.

If the disease be in the digestive tract below the stomach, the sugars and starches should be given sparingly, if at all, and the main reliance be placed upon the nitrogenous foods digested in the stomach.

Beef tea and the beef extracts of the market are useful as stimulants, but of no value as direct nutrients, according to Baron Liebig, Sir William Roberts, Dr. Milner Fothergill, Prof. Chittenden and others.

In selecting the food appropriate for the sick, the above principles should guide.

A list of serviceable foods is here subjoined.

In selecting from this list, or from other sources of supply, effort should be made to procure that which is chemically appropriate, and at the same time physiologically suited, i. e., agreeable to the appetite and not opposed to any personal idiosyncracy—such as constitutional aversion or uniform unfavorable effects from use.

The most convenient proteids are cheese, peas, beans, lentils, meats, poultry, fish, eggs and cereals.

The most convenient fats are butter, cream, fat meats,

vegetable oils, nuts, corn and oats.

The most convenient C. H. O are starch, sugar, rice, potatoes, cereals, peas, beans, lentils, garden vegetables and fruits.

"For making bread from the flour of the entire wheat, take two quarts of un-ifted entire wheat flour, a little less than a quart of warm water, one-half cup of sugar (or less if desired), one-half cake of compressed or ordinary dry yeast, and a little salt. Dissolve the yeast in part of the water, mix sugar, flour and salt, and add the yeast and the remainder of the water. Stir well and set in a warm place. When the dough has risen to twice the original amount, stir down and put in tins for baking, allowing it to rise a second time. This bread requires longer and slower baking than ordinary white bread. This quantity makes two loaves of bread of ordinary size."—Prof. L. M. Underwood, Columbia College, New York.

Another method is: One pint whole wheat flour, one pint milk and one egg, mixed and poured into hot gem

pans and baked in a hot oven thirty minutes.

FRUITS AND NUTS are not strictly prepared foods, yet they are so healthful, convenient and adjustable that a brief outline of their utility is in place.

Dr. Dupoury, of Paris, divides fruits into five classes,

viz.:

 The Acid, i. e., cherries, strawberries, gooseberries, peaches, nectarines, apples, lemons, oranges, limes and pineapples. 2. The Sweet, i. e., plums, grapes, raisins, prunes, prunels, figs, dates and huckleberries.

 The Astringent, i. e., persimmons, pomegranates, cranberries, blackberries, sumachberries, dewberries, raspberries, barberries, quinces, pears, wild cherries and medlars.

4. The Oily, i. e., olives and cocoanut.

5. The Mealy, i. e., bananas, and some apples.

Not having his distribution of fruits under this classification at hand, I have ventured to make it as above.

Oranges, figs, prunes, mulberries, dates, plums, and some pears are laxative because of their relaxant properties.

 Strawberries and raspberries are excellent for the bilious and for the plethoric and gouty. Cherries not good in neuralgia of stomach. The juciest apples are more digestible than the mealy.

Oranges, the juice of two before breakfust, good to starve the doctors. Lemon, lime and pineapple juice good

for diphtheria.

Lemon juice good for gout.

"Apples excite the action of the liver, promote sound and healthy sleep and thoroughly disinfect the mouth: also agglutinate the surplus acids of the stomach, help the kidney secretions, and prevent calculous growths, while they obviate indigestion and are one of the best preventives known of diseases of the throat."

Eight ounces of apples with twelve ounces of entire wheat bread make an admirable meal at quite moderate work. The addition of butter fits it for more active labor.

"The English medical journal, *The Lancet*, gives the case of a child three years of age, ill eighteen months, blind, covered with ulcers from head to foot, in constant

pain, pronounced incurable by eight eminent physicians, put by the ninth on a diet of ripe fruits and sugar or honey. In three days began to improve, in a few more opened his eyes for the first time in over a year, and at the end of three and a half months was pronounced cured."—H. M. Poole.

Cholera infantum has been treated successfully by sending the little patients to peach orchards to live.

2. Plums prevent gout and articular rheumatism.

The grape cure for the anæmic, dyspeptic, consumptive, the bilious and the gouty. Huckleberry juice excellent in fever.

3. The astringent fruits are especially useful in looseness of the bowels.

Juice of raw cranberries, diluted, good in typhoid fever.

4. Olive oil especially useful for defects of the excretory ducts of the skin.

5. Bananas are much like potatoes in food value.

Mealy apples are richer in nutriment than others.

Fruits should be eaten at the beginning of a meal, or between meals.

According to Dr. Sophie Lepper, the English food specialist—

"Almonds, blanched, give brain and muscle food with no heat or waste. (This is a mistake. Each ounce gives 177 calories of heat.—S. H. P.)

"Apples give nerve and muscle food, but do not give stay. (They contain more phosphorus than any other fruit or vegetable.—S. H. P.)

"Figs, dried, give nerve and muscle food, heat and

waste, but are bad for the liver.

"Grapes, green, water, of little food value, but blood purifying.

- "Grapes, blue, feeding and blood purifying; too rich for bad livers.

- "Oranges, refreshing and feeding; not good if liver is out of order.
- "Pine kernels, give heat and stay; serve as a substitute for bread.
- "Prunes, give nerve and brain food, heat and waste; not muscle feeding, and bad for liver.
 - "Raisins, are stimulating in proportion to their quality.
 - "Small seed fruits (fresh), are mostly laxative.
 "Stone fruits, are not good for liver troubles.
 - "Tomatoes, have the same effect as lemons.
 - "Walnuts, give nerve and muscle food, heat and waste."
 - "Walnuts, give nerve and muscle food, heat and waste." Pineapples, olives and apples aid digestion.

Vegetables contain so much woody fiber that they require very strong digestive fluids and muscular contractions for their digestion, and after all they contain very little nutritive substance.

Compare, per ounce, turnips with nuts (average), parsnips with prunes, cabbage with peanuts, potatoes with rice. beets with eggs:

The tubers, parsnips, beets, turnips, and sometimes potatoes and cabbage often must be excluded from the dietary.

An important rule is: Articles of food should be eaten together which will be digested in about the same length of time.

The large quantity of potash salts in vegetables retards their digestion.

Fruits are digested very quickly; apples in one to one and a half hours. Hence fruits and vegetables should not be eaten together.

When sweet fruits are taken freely, starch foods should be correspondingly diminished.

They consist of living almost exclusively for several weeks upon grapes freshly picked, several pounds a day being consumed at regular intervals, and nothing but bread and water besides. The small amount of nitrogenous matter supplied by this diet renders it unfit for active conditions or for long continued use, but grape juice can be advantageously combined with an otherwise almost exclusive albuminous diet in most cases where that is found necessary.

A method of home preservation is to put into a kettle with one-fourth pint of water eight quarts of grapes just ripe but not over ripe, and scald slowly, mash them, drain four to six hours, express the juice and drain again, then sweeten to taste, boil the juice fifteen to twenty minutes, skimming frequently, pour hot into heated bottles, fill full and cork tightly with hot boiled corks, seal with wax and

keep in a cool place. Will keep indefinitely.

HINTS CONCERNING YOUNG CHILDREN IN SUMMER.

Bathe the child once a day in luke-warm water; if feeble, twice a day.

No tight bandaging.

Make the inner garment of light flannel.

The outer clothing light, cool and loose.

Use clean diapers always.

Give the child a bed by itself and put it in awake

Never coddle a well child to sleep in the arms.

Never give soothing syrup nor sleeping drops.

Never give candy or cake to quiet it.

Keep in the fresh air, under shade, not in rooms heated for domestic purposes.

Give breast milk, if possible, once in two or three hours

during the day, and seldom as possible at night.

Remove the child from the breast if it falls asleep.

Never give the breast when you are over-fatigued or over-heated.

If hand-feeding must be resorted to, try pure, fresh, unskimmed cow's milk. Add to each nursing-bottle full a half-teaspoonful of sugar, and if the milk is very rich, young infants should have it diluted with one-fourth part of hot water. Prepare the milk by filling soda-bottles to within two inches of the top, cork tightly, set into cold water on the stove and bring it nearly to the boiling point, and keep it there about twenty minutes, then remove from stove and cool slowly, set aside in a cool place. Do not open until needed

If such milk disagrees add a tablespoonful of lime water

to each bottle.

It this disagrees try pure cream diluted with threefourths or four-fifths of pure water for a few days, then return to the milk. If this fails try some of the prepared infant's foods.

Use plain nursing-bottle with a rubber nipple and no tube, and soak both bottle and nipple, between meals, in water containing a little soda.

Do not wean the child just before or during hot weather; usually, not until after its second summer.

After six months old a little stale bread and milk may be given twice a day. After eight months old one meal a day of the yolk of fresh eggs rare-boiled.

From three or four mouths, slightly sweet or neutral fruits may constitute a part of the daily diet.

BATHS.

The principal objects of bathing are cleanl ness, some change in the functions of the skin, some change in the determination of the blood, some change in the temperature of the body, or part of it, or some change of func-

tional activity. Baths are named from the degree of temperature employed: Cold, 33° to 55°; cool, 55° to 65°; lukewarm, 65° to 70°; tepid, 70° to 85°; warm, 85° to

95; hot, 95° to 110°.

Cola Baths suddenly and powerfully contract the capillaries of the surface, and force the blood inward, thus stimulating the heart and large arteries to a vigorous effort to drive it back, which, if successful, is the reaction which glows and invigorates. But if the vital organs be weak and the capillaries sluggish, congestions dangerous to health, and even to life, are apt to result. Cold baths should be taken in a very few minutes.

Cold baths remove solids from the system, by increasing respiration, increase the number of corpuscles, the

amount of hemoglob n and glandular activity.

Cold local baths, that is, applied to one part only, in reaction draw the blood to the part in order to replace the heat lost in the bath. Taylor says that a sitting bath, the water of which has been raised two degrees by the heat of the body, has caused the absorption by the blood of the oxygen of four or five cubic feet of air, "enough to raise a half pint of water from the freezing to the boiling point, and has eliminated from the system more than a half-ounce of its solid material."

Sea Bathing is the most stimulative form of cold bathing, the invigorating effects of the simple cold bath being heightened by the saline constituents of the water and the revulsive effect of the waves against the skin, aided also by the bracing air of the shore, temporary change in food, habits, etc.

A good substitute for a sea bath is the following mixture of salts dissolved in about thirty-eight gallons of water tor one bath: Ten pounds of chloride of sodium (common

salt), five pounds of sulphate of sodium (Glauber's salt), seven and one-half pounds of chloride of magnesia, and two and one-half pounds of chloride of calcium.

Cool Baths, in a person of ordinary health, slightly relax the skin, impart vigor, soothe the extremities of the nerves, and abate internal blood pressure. But in prostrate conditions, the effects are the same as from cold baths.

Tepid Baths are mild yet efficient relaxants to the skin and extremities of the nerves, relieving internal engorgements and soothing the entire system. Yet they are not suitable to strong local, or general congestion, flaccidity of structures, cool surface, colliquative perspiration, threatening gangrene, or chronic weakness of vital energy (Cook). They should take ten to fifteen minutes only.

Warm Baths are stimulating and relaxing to the surface, and soothing to nervous excitability. If continued long they excite perspiration, and may cause oppression, languor and giddiness, because the internal process of heat production is retarded, elimination of solids is checked, and respiration diminished. Time thirty to sixty minutes

Hot Baths, rarely over 100°, strongly arouse the capillary circulation by the effort of the body to return the surplus heat given to it, relieve local rheumatism and neuralgia, accompanied by partial congestion when applied locally in the form of fomentations. They are not advisable when the skin is cold and clammy, except when impregnated with the strongest stimulants, e. g., capsicum or mustard. With perspiration excessive and warm, they are of great service. Hot baths are useful to restore warmth to the body in cases of profound shock, or after exposure to severe celd, but in the latter case the circulation must be first gradually restored. They should be

avoided if the patient expects to be exposed to cold within a few hours.

Hot baths should not be taken except as a remedy for disease, baths of lower temperature accomplishing all that is needed for ordinary purposes. Duration five to thirty minutes.

Pack Baths consist in wrapping the entire body in a sheet wrung out of water, with blankets so enveloping him as to maintain a tepid warmth in every part, thus producing the same effects as the tepid bath, but to a far greater degree, even to the extent of promoting the absorption of internal effusions. Sleep ensues as a consequence of the general relaxation, and care must be used, for if the pack be continued too long the over-relaxation may produce inability to tone up afterward, in serious cases.

Compresses are simply cold, local packs; fomentations are hot. For the latter, wet from two to four thicknesses of cotton, or linen, in the water or decoction selected, heated according to the case, and cover with three to six thicknesses of dry flannel, projecting on all sides three inches beyond the wet, and bind firmly in place. If continuous heat is required, change the wet cloth frequently, without removing the dry, by lifting the dry and slipping the wet under it as hot as can be borne. In congestions the moisture is absorbed through the capillary walls, detaching the adhering corpuscles and unclogging the blood vessels.

Vapor Baths, 110° to 140°. The famous Russian bath is vapor. The early Thomsonian method was to seat the patient enveloped in blankets, in a chair set on slats across the top of a tub of hot water, into which hot bricks or stones were put.

Another method is, to generate the vapor by putting an alcohol lamp, with or without a tin of water over it, under a chair, with blankets tent-like about both. This is the hydro-alcoholic bath.

Another way is, for the patient to lie in bed with the clothes raised by supporting half hoops, and have the vapor conducted under the bed clothes, or a vessel of steaming hot water put under the clothes.

Another way is, to surround the patient in bed with several hot bricks wrapped in cloths, and pour vinegar or

alcohol on them.

However they may be taken, vapor baths should not be continued many minutes after the face perspires freely. They are far more penetrating and powerful than sponge baths, securing a full outward flow of blood, breaking up internal congestions, and stimulating the entire surface.

In scarlatina, measles, smallpox, erysipelas, hydrophobia. chronic skin affections, colds, rheumatism, ague, flooding, acute dy sentery, lockjaw, dropsy, chronic abscesses, etc., they are invaluable. The bowels should be first emptied by a full injection of hot water, else the contents may be absorbed and carried through the system toward the surface.

The vapor bath should not be risked in conditions of decided prostration, in heart troubles or diseases of the large blood vessels, or in internal mortification. Persons of very delicate nervous organization are liable to faint in it because of the sudden flow of blood from the brain to the surface, and they may feel prostrated for days by it.

General Rules for Bathing. Those suffering from heart disease, faint spells, or congestion of the brain, should

never bathe in the surf.

Full baths of any kind should not be taken within one

hour before a meal; within two hours after a meal; when much fatigued, or otherwise exhaust-d; when the body is cooling after perspiration; when cold from previous exposure (except the warm bath).

The ears should be protected with light cotton plugs in

surf bathing.

Should lassitude result from surf bathing, or persistent chilliness, or numbness, discontinue it and rest; also take a strong cup of coffee, but do not try to "walk it off," as that will exhaust still more. Contrary to general opinion, the *feet* should be first wet, then the head, if preferred.

In all baths, heavy shocks should be avoided. The bath should be adapted to the person. If a cold bath is recommended for a certain condition, and the patient is used to warm baths only, begin with a tepid, gradually reduce to cool, then to cold. The abuse of water by enthusiastic believers in its virtues, is as much to be guarded against as its proper use is to be encouraged.

Women should take only such baths during the last two months of pregnancy, or while menstruating, as are ap-

propriate to their condition.

The rule not to bathe within two hours after a meal, is of the utmost importance, as many cases of fatal "cramp" are due to the plunge into cold wafer when the stomach contains much food.

A patient suffering from dry asthma, with cold perspiration during paroxysm, would be injured by a tepid bath.

In excessive urination with a dry skin, a tepid sponge, or vapor bath, will diminish the flow. On the other hand, a cool bath, when the skin is moist, especially with an astringent added, will increase the discharge from the kidneys when that is deficient. (Cook.)

Persons who have reached the decline of life, whether

at fifty or seventy-five years of age, should avoid chills from whatever baths they allow. (From my "Secrets of Health.")

Water may be advantageously used internally in constipation, by sipping a glass on rising. In typhoid fever by taking eight to ten ounces an hour, sterilized. In cholera by using large quantities of hot water frequently as bowel enemas. By sipping hot water, one-half to one pint, thirty minutes before meals in nearly all stomach disorders. Should be sipped, because in sipping the action of the nerve which slows the beat of the heart is abolished, hence the circulation is quickened, the secretion of the bile is also hastened.

EXERCISES.

Increased oxygenation, more rapid metamorphosis of tissue, improved digestion and sleep, and the development and augmented strength of the muscles employed, are the constitutional results of exercise.

The specific kind to be employed in any case should

depend upon the particular need of the case.

In general terms, all women, except those who live by hard, manual toil, need to strengthen the muscles of the abdomen, hips and back, and thus prevent or cure the malpositions of the pelvic organs, which cause the major part of their miseries, as well as to give them the muscular strength needed for safe child-bearing.

All nervous debilities, dyspeptic troubles, liver complaints and pulmonary ailments in both sexes, require lung expansion and increased strength of the muscles of the

chest.

All *muscular* debilities call for the *systematic* use of the muscles implicated, not for mechanical braces as a substitute for vigor of fiber.

With these principles in view the adaptation of different

forms of exercise may be briefly considered

Walking, if done with an elastic step, that swings the weight of the body from one foot to the other, is the king of all exercises for universal usefulness. But it must be walking not dawdling. If even but five yards can be covered, let it be with the swing of gladness for power to move at all, and more power will be born of the moving joy.

Carriage riding, especially with a cheerful companion, at an exhilirating gait, is a valuable form of exercise for the feeble, which may be changed by a moping pace and a glum associate into a funeral effect upon the spirits and

and nerves.

The Bicycle is dangerously potent for good or ill, according to the judgment displayed in its use. As a rule, scorching is but a significant euphonysm for physical damage. Race riding, with its execrable posture, is too insane an act to be even mentioned as hygienic.

Going away from home until tired, is transforming exer-

cise into exhausting work to cover the return.

Starting rapidly, or pushing up-hill suddenly, before the respiration is quickened to correspond with the more rapid heart-beats is to invite faintness, giddiness or hemorrhage.

Riding with a saddle that irritates the perineum is the sure precursor of very troublesome, and, it may be, seri-

ous disease of the genital organs in both sexes.

Pedaling rapidly soon after a hearty meal, if done frequently, is certain to derange the circulation, and prepare the way for a thrifty dyspepsia.

Avoiding these dangers, the bicycle is a blessing to the

race, particularly to the female sex.

There is little doubt that the marked decrease in the

number of female consumptives in Massachusetts during the past six years (in 1890 it was 1055 to 1,000 males; in 1896 it was 974 to 1,000); is owing mainly to the greater habituation of young women to out-door sports and recreations, among which the wheel has been the chief factor.

Rowing, as a muscular exercise, gives precisely the development of strength in the abdomen and thighs that women need, at the same time securing the chest expansion and deep respiration which are of even greater importance.

Horseback Riding, if habitual, is an almost unmatched exercise for both sexes. No mere machine, however perfect, can ever fill the place of a noble horse whose every motion is a thrill of magnetism, and whose spirit is instinct with a life that penetrates and vitalizes every nerve of his rider.

But he must be a horse, not a hack, and horse and rider must be in *sympathy*, so that the bounding pulses of the one shall throw tides of magnetic vigor into the other.

Blessed are they who can thus ride.

But a "swinging gallop" only once a month or so, is only a pleasant fiction that hides the semi-dislocations and inconvenient lacerations that make the hardest part of the ride the day after. Females should not indulge in such pastimes, because they come too infrequently to strengthen supporting muscles that they tax to an extreme and often relaxing degree.

Golf, lawn tennis, etc., in garments that neither restrict respiration nor impede the circulation, should be sought

when not too tired.

But all these presuppose quite a stock of vitality to begin with.

What can those do who are shut in, and are, perhaps,

too poor to afford any of the means of exercise implied in the foregoing?

We answer, perhaps not quite as well, but well enough

to reap the results of exercise in the open air.

A couch or hammock in a shady nook in summer, and the same, or even only a chair in a sheltered corner where the sun shines in winter, comfortably wrapped if need be with feet in a box covered with a warm blanket, or even with a hot water bottle, if necessary, at least two hours of every day, may be spent in the open air, when storms do not forbid.

While there, exercise by using OXYGEN as directed in "NATURE'S CURE," the best, the most reasonable, the most effective exercise ever devised for the general relief of human ills.

"It is not the exertion that is beneficial in exercise, but what is gained by ex-rcise—circulation of the blood and absorption of oxygen." "If the vital force generated is dissipated in the getting, no gain is made." "It takes at least five inspirations and exhalations to complete the" (one) "act of respiration."

Therefore, the method is:

1. Either lying down, sitting or standing, draw through the nose as much air as will fully expand both chest and abdomen, clap the thumb and finger against the nostrils (not pinch them) and try to force out the air against the resistance of that obstruction. After a second or two let out the air. Do not hold long enough to produce dizziness.

2. Then take four short, natural inspirations. In these the oxygen is absorbed.

3. Every fifth time proceed as in 1.

4. For beginners and weak persons, one to two minutes is enough for one treatment, but it should be gradually extended to ten or fifteen minutes.

5. Two to six treatments a day.

6. Do not force the fifth respiration so as to produce sore muscles or irritate the lungs, but as much as you can without doing so.

Adhere strictly to this plan.

We have not space to explain the whole philosophy of this method, but assure our readers that it is thoroughly scientific, reasonable and practically successful.

What more is required?

Your doctor does not explain why and how his medi-

cines are supposed to cure.

Take this "Nature's Cure" upon the same basis of trust, and use it, especially if deprived of the means to get other things; use this patiently, perseveringly, hopefully, and our word for it, if nature can cure she will! The smallest article that can be seen by the naked human eye is about I-100,000 of an inch on a side, and is composed of from sixty to one hundred million molecules.

Risteen, in his work on molecules and the molecular theory, says, that if every man, woman and child in the world i. e., 1,468,000,000, were to lay down in a straight line a molecule of carbonic acid gas, the line would not be a yard long.

Prof. Wm. Crooks, of London, says, that to count the molecules in a pin head at the rate of 10,000,000 per sec-

ond would require 250,000 years.

A grain of musk has perfumed a room for twenty years, and in that time must have given off 320,000,000,000,000,000,000 particles.

Will the objector kindly inform us how much oxygen is necessary to effect the movements of a few millions of molecules?

REST AND RECREATION.

Why needed.—The great American nation has become nervous, dyspeptic, sexually weak, and physically degenerated, largely by the untamed spirit of drive and conquest, which is the product of its environment and history.

Three more generations of retrogression, and, as a people, we shall be the scorn of the civilized world. It is time to hall; and the first reformation should be on the high ground of rest. Greed must check his speed, ambition must take time to breathe, competition must ease up for a holiday.

The Incessant Grind of the busy brain needs a let-up; and it will have it, or the impinging fibers will grind each other away. This is the very point that we are deploring. The damage to the brain-fiber is reporting itself in the nerves, stomach, manhood-power, and physical stature and strength of the younger generation. More holidays, and half-holidays, a sacred rest-hour in the hum of the day, business locked into the mill, bank, counting-room, office, store or shop, when it is closed for the night, instead of being welcomed at the home fireside and transformed into a hideous nightmare in the sleep-hours!

Rest, rest, REST, is what we need.

Reform the Schools.—But the mandate will never be heeded until the example is set in our public schools. Stuff, CRAM, FORCE, is the very spirit of school boards and teachers' institutes, until the young brain takes on an habitual type of high pressure, which will be maintained later on in the business of life until the machine crashes and the untimely end is reached.

None the less imperative is Nature's call for rest.

The habit of semi-sleep-rest should be cultivated. Sit easily in an easy chair, hands folded on lap, chin fallen upon chest, eyes closed, and breathe slowly way down to the pelvic bone, minute after minute, and soon (thinking only of the deep breathing) the whole organism will sleep, consciousness only being half dreamily alert. This rest-faculty ought to be cultivated, especially by all nervous people and brain workers.

Rest One Day in Seven is a law of Nature, as well as a law of God. The observation of Sir Robert Peel, that no man can work seven days in the week without prematurely breaking down, has been abundantly demonstrated

in many ways.-Secrets of Health.

Recreations.—These are any methods of employing the time, other than the habitual ones, the outcome of which is

re-creative to the vital powers. This definition excludes all violent exercises that are more exhausting than recuperating; all methods that tease the nerves into irritability; and all that interfere with the dominancy of good, established habits.

As a general rule, recreation should be in the line of the partial or total disuse of the functions and energies that bear the ordinary strain of life, and the substituted use of that part of the nature that can be most pleasurably employed under the circumstances.

À day off on an excursion or picnic, or fishing or hunting, if attended with constant worriment over the expense,

is not recreation.

Visiting, with a perpetual fret over the proprieties of the occasion, is not rest.

A public dance or other entertainment where fashionable attire destroys physical comfort, even though it please personal vanity, is not re-cuperation. For the habitual brain worker to rush through a fiction, or any other book, is not giving the brain cells a holiday.

For the mother to go vacationing and take all the younger children with her, is not disusing the faculties

that are every day on the strain.

Better have ten hours of genuine recreation than a whole week of sham—labeled "vacation!!!"

Rests and recreations should be timed in frequency to

the running down of the energies.

Some men can go months without any beyond what each night and Sunday afford, but others need it every week, and many in poor health, every day. A twenty-four-hour clock must be wound oftener than a seven-day timepiece.

When the balance wheel begins to vibrate feebly, the

winding should come. Better a little before, but none should ever wait for it to stop.

The whole secret of the matter is, all the vital powers act more vigorously under pleasurable recreation. Hence digestion and assimilation, secretion and excretion are then at their best

Therefore the true economist who finds it necessary to employ remedies, will reinforce them with the best practical conditions of recovery, i. e., all the rest and recreation that his case requires; bearing in mind the fact, that it is the worst of spendthrift policy to try to make the remedies do their own work and that of rest and recreation also

The general rule given as to the disuse of the regularly hard worked faculties is all the suggestion that can profitably be made of the particular kind of recreation for an individual case, it being understood that preference should always be given to that kind which lies furthest from the artificialities of life, nearest to nature, and calls into play most thoroughly the involuntary processes of respiration, circulation, digestion, assimilation and excretion.

Whenever feasible, and it can be made so much oftener than is thought possible, camping out from four to sixteen

weeks should be the aim of every invalid.

It needs no elaborate pa aphernalia. Just a little nook beside some lake or running stream; a party of four congenial spirits, a small tent, a few unbreakable cooking utensils, some tin crockery for the company, and for each an army blanket, a rubber blanket, one or two changes of undergarments, rubber overshoes, tooth-brush. comb, soap, and two towels, needles, thread, pins and safety pins, pocket testament, a few postal-cards if far from home, and some hunting and fishing gear. In the absence of a tent,

a covered wagon will answer for the females, and the men can build themselves a brush hut for the occasion. The provisioning is of great importance. Cereal coffee for ordinary use, and Java and Mocha mixed for times of special exposure, condensed milk, canned fruits and vegetables, hard-tack and crackers, entire wheat flour for pancakes, sugar, salt pork, salt and pepper, vinegar, and some preserved fruit juice, if practicable; no butter, nor other things that will deteriorate rapidly.

If any particular stomach troubles need to be provided for, that should be done for five to ten days, then rely upon the general dietary. Two square meals and a hand lunch a day, eight to ten hours' sleep, cheerfulness, fun and frolic

to the utmost capacity.

Such a two or three months' life is worth more to the ailing than twice the length of time in any sanitarium on

earth at five to ten times the expense.

No medicines, but a full set of Biochemic Salts for emergencies. Of course, a hatchet, matches, some loose cords, fine and coarse, a little old muslin for bandages, and a plentiful supply on the part of each of a fixed purpose to make all the others as happy as possible.

Of course the plan is elastic enough to admit of any

desired increase in the number, but with the one absolutely essential qualification, NO CHRONIC GRUMBLER, and NO TWO DISGRUNTLED ASKANCE-LOOKERS admitted on any terms.

If any special justification of this plan is needed it is found in the fact, that, when in the Crimean war, it was found necessary to put a large number of typhoid fever patients into tents, because the hospitals were full, it proved that the mortality was less, and the progress of the patients far more rapid in the tents.

The same was the experience of our own army in the war of 1861-'64.

In addition, may be cited the practice of the best insane asylum on this continent—the McLean, at Waverly, Mass.—erected at a cost of \$1,250,000, where "Food and fresh Air" constitute the line of treatment, as they do also at Dr. E. L. Trudeau's famous establishment for the cure of tuberculosis at Saranac Lake. N. Y.

WARMTH.

An egg can never be hatched in a refrigerator. Warmth nourishes life; cold devitalizes. The reason is, the white blood corpuscles (leucocytes) are paralyzed by cold, so that their defensive work, in protecting from microbes, is diminished, or ceases altogether.

The only exception to this law is the law of reaction, upon which the utility of baths is based. A temporary chill, by means of the nervous telegraphy, immediately calls for reinforcements, and they come rushing in with the blood-current that seeks to restore the balance of circulation, and that temporary influx of the defenders raises the vitality of the part.

Hence, a law of recovery is-no chill, however pro-

duced, that cannot be overcome by vital reaction, within a very few minutes at most, is ever beneficial.

It is useless to try to toughen by any such measures!!

SLEEP.

"Tired nature's sweet restorer, balmy sleep," is a nice thing to talk about and a nice thing to have. Our physical systems are geared for a sixteen-hour run, and can only be run to the best advantage on that plan. Because the brain never recuperates except in sleep.

When worry, pain, care, greed or nervousness prolong that run to eighteen or twenty hours, something will give

way sooner or later.

Eight hours for work, eight for sleep (for adults), and eight for all other things, is Nature's plan.

How to get the eight hours sleep is the great question.

The requisites are:

1. Sufficient previous exercise to cause a little tire, without enough weariness to create fatigue-fever.

2. A mind willing to sleep and ready to *glide*, not force itself into it.

- 3. A well-ventilated room, by which is meant a fresh supply of air from an opening one inch by twenty, at least, in moderately cool weather, and a wide open window in summer time.
- 4. A hard bed, but not hard enough to make the bones ache, i, e,, a mattress of husks or hair, or better, woven wire springs covered with a blanket, and as light top covering as can be used without chill.
- 5. An extra blanket always within reach to draw over in the night, when the bodily temperature sinks.

6. Occupy the bed alone.

7. Lie on the right side, head slightly inclined towards

the chest, resting on a low, hard pillow, knees slightly drawn up, arms in the most easy position possible, and no hard pressure anywhere that will impede the circulation or cause discomfort an hour or more later.

8. If the thoughts will run, fix them on the least interesting subject possible, and then care not a continental

whether you sleep or not .

9. Should restlessness come nevertheless, get up, pour a little cool or cold water down the spine, then see-saw with a long towel thrown over between the shoulders, so as to create a friction over the spine. When comfortably tired try the bed again.

10. If too much debilitated for this, the same principles

can be applied by the aid of nurse or friend.

11. Abjure all sleeping potions.

12. Build the nervous system up to the sleep point by hygienic measures, and Kali. Phos. four to six times a day.

13. Never try to sleep with cold feet, but plunge them into cold water and jump into bed without drying. If too feeble to secure immediate reaction, dry with a flesh brush or coarse towel after the cold plunge, or, if necessary, have them rubbed or whipped into warmth.

14. Never try to sleep when hungry, nor take a full

meal just before retiring.

15. Never try to sleep with a guilty conscience.

16. Never work the brain hard within an hour of retiring. If ill or nervous, not within three to five hours.

17. If loaded with care, never try to sleep until you can

"cast your burden upon Him who careth for you."

Brain workers, users of alcoholic stimulants, large eaters, pregnant and nursing women, and rapidly-growing children need more sleep than others, ordinarily can scarcely get too much.

COLON FLUSH.

This is a system of flushing the bowels employed by the writer for several years. It originated in suggestions accompanying various clinical reports in different medical journals, and was greatly enlarged later after reading Dr. Wilfred Hall's wonderful elucidation of the benefits of his plan. In this treatment an attempt is made to adapt the quantity, temperature and frequency of the flushes to the condition of the patient. The colon is a sewer, the position and construction of which is such that it cannot be flushed out from end to end, therefore the only practicable way is to pump it full and cleanse by emptying. This requires from four to eight pints of fluid. The essentials are, a good bulb or fountain syringe, preferably both, with a tube eighteen to twenty inches long between the bulb and the delivery pipe. A large soft rubber catheter to be attached to the delivery pipe of the syringe. If this cannot be obtained, the ordinary vaginal pipe of a family syringe will answer. A rolled blanket for the hips, a pillow for the head.

How to take it.—If the rectum is empty, begin in any way that suits; but if it is packed, lie on back, hips on rolled blanket, shoulders to bed or floor, insert the pipe and inject very slowly, so as to soften the mass and allow it to pass away. Then, if the bowel is packed on the left side, lie on left side, hip on blanket, left breast to bed, thighs bent close to pelvis, inject slowly, retain until desire to stool is felt, then expel. Repeat, as strength permits, until all hardness is removed from the left side, then turn on back, hips elevated, inject slowly until full, rest, turn on right side, slowly fill again until desire to stool is felt, then pass it away.

Observe.-If much prostration ensues take a cup of hot

capsicum tea, or of hot coffee, either before or after, or both; or better still, three to six grains of Kali. Phos. in a

cup of hot water.

Should it be difficult to discharge the water, dissolve in it a teaspoonful of table salt, and gently knead the colon from the right groin up to just below the short ribs and across, just below the stomach, and down into the left groin.

Flushes hot enough to excite free perspiration should never be employed when the bowel contains a mass of foul

matter.

In fermenting conditions, should be used with sufficient frequency to prevent the absorption of the poisonous products into the blood-stream. Best time is in the evening.

In simple constipation without fermentation, the best

time is on rising in the morning.

Should be used regularly, not infrequently, as long as required.

When it causes discharges of mucous or slimy matter, it shows the need of frequent cleansing.

Its immediate physiological effects are, purification of the blood, relief of congestion of the pelvic organs, and their vitalization, hence its great value in diseases of the pelvic organs.

Rules for Temperature.

Cool or cold for inflammation; fevers without marked prostration, and as a tonic, but never so as to produce chilliness.

Tepid, to produce relaxation; to promote absorption, and in obese conditions.

Warm, to soothe.

Hot, for antiseptic use, if water alone is employed;

to relieve pain; promote perspiration; as a stimulant; and to recuperate in fatigue.

Any temperature when used as an ant-acid or antiseptic

medium for the employment of chemicals.

THE THERMO-OZONE TREATMENT.

The Thermo-Ozone Battery is the name given to an appliance (not an electrical battery), by which a difference of thirty or more degrees between the battery and its poles, generates an unfelt current that decomposes water and carries the ozone directly into the venous current, thus purifying the blood and vitalizing the nerves. It is also capable of carrying medicines, when placed in solution in contact with the positive pole, into the tissues adjacent to it. Its great superiority over all forms of electricity for the cure of disease (except when the cautery is necessary) has been demonstrated so often that it needs no further proof.

It is the invention of Dr. S. R. Beckwith, for many years an eminent surgeon in the West, but now living in New York city.

It is run by putting the battery into cold or hot water, and its poles upon or near the seat of the disease. The current gives no sensation, costs nothing after the purchase of the battery, and is guaranteed for two years.

It is furnished by the author of this book, and instructions for its use given without further charge. It constitutes a part of our "Ideal Treatment" in obstinate cases.

NUCLEIN TREATMENT.

This consists in supplying to the system the vital material of the lymphatic glands of animals, the effect of which is immediately to multiply the leucocytes, and thus increase the protective power of the blood against disease, and also its reparative processes.

Various preparations have been made, but Proto-nuclein is the best adapted to use by the people, and while not designed for them, except as prescribed by a physician, it is infinitely safer than the opiates, narcotics and other drugs, etc., that they so generally use.

As a substitute for this, when not readily obtainable,

the following treatment is specially commended.

BLOOD TREATMENT (Hæmatherapy.)

This consists in opposing to disease such a good and sufficient blood-supply as would have prevented the disease, had it been possessed at the outset. The blood of bullocks, sheep or chickens may be used; in rare cases the blood of human beings is employed by transfusion. The treatment introduces blood, preferably mixed with salted water in various proportions according to the case, by the stomach, rectum, hypodermic injection, or by absorption from a raw surface.

In the hands of skilled physicians it is by far the most successful form of treatment ever devised, especially in such desperate conditions as advanced consumption, typhoid fever, pernicious anamia, cholera infantum, nervousness, collaspe from hemorrhage, old ulcers, gangrene, blood poisoning, crushed or decayed bones, mangled flesh,

and burns covering a large surface.

Dr. T. I. Biggs, 1690 Broadway, New York, is the chief illustrator of this system, and his address is here given solely in the interests of the readers of this book, who have failed to find relief elsewhere.

The method was not designed for domestic use, yet it is capable of very broad and wholesome adoption by the

people.

Fortunately, an article is kept at many drug stores, and can be procured by all, which contains the blood of bullocks so combined with glycerine and enough whiskey to preserve it, as to make it sterile, palatable, rich in bloodcells and of immense utility as a nutriment in weakened conditions. We have no interest in naming Bovinine beyond the desire to help the sick.

It is really a form of Nuclein treatment, with the advantage of supplying the white blood-cells ready for immediate work, and the rich pabulum of healthy blood with

which to sustain them.

In rheumatism the red blood corpuscles are diminished, therefore, the blood treatment with the Cell-Salts, especially Ferr. Phos., is indicated, together with two liters (about 67.6 ounces) of pure soft water a day.

NUTRITIVE ENEMA.

Not given as a complete treatment in itself, but as an adjunct to any of the others when necessary. Some useful ones are as follows;

NUTRITIVE ENEMAS.

No. 1. The white of an egg stirred into two ounces of of water, containing one-third of an even teaspoonful of

table salt, at a temperature of between eighty and one hundred and five degrees.

No. 2. Two ounces of salted water and one ounce of Bovinine.

No. 3. Three ounces salted water and three ounces of Bovinine.

No. 4. One grain pure Papoid dissolved in one ounce of water, i. c., two tablespoonfuls; mix with six ounces of raw lean beef, chopped fine; keep two hours at a temperature of 130 degrees. Strain through cheese cloth, and add a little boiled water. If desired, five per cent. of brandy may be added. May also be used as an embrocation when absorption is wanted.

No. 5. Two eggs, twenty grains of pepsin, ten grains of table salt, six ounces water, slightly warmed.

How Administered.

The bowels should at first be cleansed with warm water and Ivory, or some other soap of first quality. Rest a few moments, then slowly inject the enema with hips slightly elevated, and retain, if necessary with the help of a folded napkin pressed against the anus. Repeat every three to six hours.

In cases of great loss of blood, the No. 3 should be given, every two or three hours, until the system rallies, then less frequently.

In giving the enema, a large catheter should be connected with a bulb or fountain syringe. The catheter, well oiled, inserted as far as it will go without much resistance, then inject enough to distend the bowel slightly, and work the catheter in gradually eight inches, then inject the whole slowly. If there is much irritability, so that it is thrown off too soon, repeat, and, if necessary, prepare the enema with weak poppy tea instead of salt

water, or precede it with an ounce or two of elm or flax seed tea, or witch hazel solution.

Dr. Jones-Humphreys has devised an improved apparatus as follows:

A small funnel, rubber tube half inch in diameter and eighteen inches long, one end connected with the funnel, the other with a piece of glass tubing, and joined to a rubber catheter. The catheter is inserted, the enema poured into the funnel and allowed to work in by absorption. The glass tubing shows the descending nutriment.

MY IDEAL TREATMENT.

When we consider the number and complexity of diseases, it should not be deemed strange that with all their power for good, no one of the foregoing treatments is always successful, even in all curable cases, e.g., the biochemic may fail for the want of germicides or organic nutriment; germicides may fail for lack of either biochemics or organic nutriment; the oxygen treatment may not succeed for lack of any or all the others; the blood treatment may not be a success because of insufficient antisepsis and too little oxygen.

All these together may prove unavailing by reason of a fountain of corruption in the colon, saturating the blood with its poisons. The thermo-ozone battery may fail because of a lack of the biochemic salts or of organic nutriment

Therefore a combination of two or more of these means of cure is always necessary in cases that do not readily yield to the biochemics alone. Which of these shall be combined in any particular case must depend upon the nature of the case, circumstances of the patient, and the availability of these means.

PRINCIPLES OF GUIDANCE.

1. The Cell-Salts first, last, and all the time, in every disease, rejecting the preposterous assumption that fifty cents' worth will cure a disease of years' standing and that has baffled the skill of home physicians and the power of many dollars' worth of patent medicines.

2. The colon cleansed every twenty-four to forty-eight hours by natural, full, soft movements, or by the flush, except in extreme cases when very little nutriment is taken or great prostration without fecal poisoning contraindi-

cate it.

3. Baths for cleansing and to control temperature should

never be neglected.

4. Diet always to be adapted to the condition of the patient, so as to give full nitrogenous nutrition, meaning by full all the respiratory power in use can furnish oxygen to digest, also such fuel-foods (that is, fats and C. H. O.) as the nature of the case admits. This may be, preferably, sometimes fats, at other times C. H. O. either in vegetables or fruit juice, or some such preparation as Paskola, or, in extreme cases, the alcoholics, simply as foods, not as narcotic stimulants.

5. Oxygen to the full extent of the respiratory capacity, and that capacity increased by "Nature's Cure" method.

6. When the oxygen in use fails to master the germs of the disease, then resort to such antiseptics as may be most available, and best suited to the case.

7. It is presupposed that in all these, rest, sleep, exercise and recreation have their proper and methodical use.

8. As a perfectly safe, yet efficient mode of antisepsis and general systemic invigoration, the Thermo-Ozone Battery is of great utility, and may economically constitute a part of the home preparations for the treatment of disease. In deciding upon which of these auxillaries to the Cell-Salts should be used in a given case, let the following questions be asked, without regard to the name of the disease, namely:

I. What is o'viously needed to support and improve

the vitality of the patient?

2. What is plainly required to neutralize and overpower the influences that depress the vitality of the patient?

3. Which of these treatments offers the needed vital support?

4. Which of these treatments furnishes the needed antag-

onism to the anti-vital influences?

Common sense with close observation and careful study of these treatments will be likely to give the answer that a competent physician would give.

Suppose a case of diphtheria to suddenly develop. Ferr. Phos. and Kali. Phos. will, of course, be administered at

once.

Seclusion in a room stripped to imperative necessity, follows immediately upon the discovery of the nature of the disease. Disinfection by Platt's chlorides, Bromo-Chloraline or Sanitas is constant. Local antisepsis of the patient, externally, by spongings of Sanitas or Peroxde of Hydrogen, and of the throat and nose if necessary, with Hydrozone, Sanitas, or in the absence of these, alcohol as hot as it can be borne, with sufficient frequency to remove and keep off the deposit. As soon as the patient is removable, disinfection of the room occurs.

CHAPTER VI.

THE CO-OPERATIVE CURATIVES OF SCIENCE.

GERMICIDES—ANTISEPTICS—DISINFECTANTS—DEODORIZERS—STIMULANTS—RELAXANTS—ASTRINGANTS.

The properties of germicides, antiseptics and disinfectants are substantially the same, i. c., they are fatal to germ life, or so sterilize the media in which they grow as to prevent their propogation. Practically the words are used as synonymous in this book. But deodorizers are such substances as have the power to destroy foul and noxous odors.

The diseased conditions in which antiseptics are appropriate, and, in most cases indispensible, because they are secondary diseases as explained on page sixty-two, are as follows, viz.:

Asthma, abscess, anthrax (charbon), apthe, bronchitis, bedsores, boils, burns, breasts ("gathered"), cancer, carbuncle, catarrh, catarrhal dyspepsia, chilblains, cholera infantum, cholera, colitis (inflamation of the colon), conjunctivitis (inflammation of conjunctiva), consumption, diphtheria, dysintery, ear discharges, empyema (a collection of purulent matter in the chest), chronic enteritis (inflammation, beginning in the coat of the small intestines), erysipelas, eye discharges, farcy and glanders; fevers—bil ious, hay, puerperal, scarlet, typhoid and yellow, fever sores, felons, fetid breath, feet malodorous, fistulas, gargrene, gumboil, gonorrhea, hemorrhoids (piles), hydrophobia, inflammations, chronic injuries, lacerations, laryn-

gitis (inflammation of larynx), leucorrhea, lock-jaw, measles, milk-leg, miscarriage, mumps, peritonitis (inflammation of membrane lining abdominal cavity), perspiration offensive, pertussis (whooping cough), pharyngitis chronic, (inflammation of pharynx) pneumonia, poisoning, scrofula, skin diseases, stomatitis, syphilis, tonsilitis, thrush, tubercles, ulcers, wounds, old.

A great variety of antiseptics have been placed upon the market, nearly all of them with some merit, but some of special excellence are named in this book, together with particular adaptations in certain cases. The list is longer than would be necessary, but for the fact, few if any of them are kept in all parts of the country, and their use should not be contingent upon ability to procure any particular kind.

It is not expected that their internal use will kill all the germs of disease, for it is very doubtful whether any one of sufficient germicidal property to do that can be inocuous to the living organism. But they do sterilize the medium in which germs propagate, and thus preventing their rapid increase, the leucocytes of the blood overcome

the germs.

The directions accompanying these antiseptics should be carefully studied.

Adaptation.

The best of remedies may be of no use or even harmful if the laws of adaptation are not studied. These laws relate to tolerance by the stomach, digestibility, non-disagreeing properties, quantity, frequency of dosage, etc. In short, everything that makes keen observation of effects better than blind following of prescription. Every person who treats himself, child or other person, puts himself thereby in the place of a physician, and is bound by the obligations of the relation to study his patient, observe the effects of everything done or omitted, and meet all unfavorable manifestations with such MODIFICATIONS of dosage or application as his common sense may dictate.

PRECAUTIONARY DISINFECTION.

In all run down conditions of the system, as well as in all cases of special exposure to disease, the precaution should be taken to use antiseptics in order to prevent the possible colonization of some of the many kinds of disease germs that are constantly swarming in the dust of the streets and in the air. For this purpose Listerine, Menthymos and Zymocide are especially pleasant and sufficiently effective.

Dr. Manfredi has discovered that the health of the people of Naples, Italy, corresponds with the number of microbes found in the dust of the streets. The healthiest streets had only 10,000,000 per gramme (the twenty-eight and three-tenths of an ounce avoirdupois), while the filthiest streets and most unhealthy sections had 5,000,000,000 per gramme. Among these were the microbes of pus, the baccillus of malignant dropsy, lock-jaw, tubercule and fatal blood-poisoning.

When it is expedient to disinfect and deodorize the hands, ground mustard rubbed on freely for five minutes, with corn meal and soap, and worked into all the creases and under the nails will be found an efficient and satisfactory article.

DISINFECTION DURING CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

The laws of different States vary somewhat in their characterization of "contagious diseases," but the following are named by one or more States as such, viz.:

Asiatic cholera, small-pox, diphtheria (membranous

croup), scarlet fever, typhoid fever, tuberculosis (consumption), yellow fever, typhus fever, measles and cerebrospinal meningitis. Some foreign countries add bubonic plague, erysipelas, and relapsing, continued and puerperal fevers

In these diseases the health of the public requires thor-

ough disinfection, which should consist of-

I. The internal use of the most appropriate antiseptic that can be had.

For all purposes Hydrozone is to be preferred, although in the milder forms of disease, Euthymol, Menthymos, Glycozone, Per-oxide of Hydrogen (medicinal), Listerine, Sanitas and Zymocide, may be relied upon.

Consult directions with the preparations, for dosage and

modes of application.

2. Sponge the body with a solution of the antiseptic, with sufficient frequency and in such strength as to destroy the germs upon the surface.

See directions with the preparation for the strength of

the solution.

3. Destroy the germicidal property of all excretions, by mixing with them hot water, two and a halt gallons, copperas four pounds, carbolic acid four pounds; or copperas ten pounds, in a bucket of water; or sulphate of zinc eight ounces, carbolic acid one ounce, water three gallons. A teacupful for a bed-pan or chamber vessel each time it is used; pour some frequently into the water closet. For drains, ditches and sewers, one pound of chloride of lime is sufficient for a thousand gallons of running sewage.

4. Render the air of the room antiseptic by free ventilation, the admission of the direct rays of the sun, unless the condition of the eyes preclude it, and by keeping cloths hung in the room wet with Platt's chlorides, Bromochloralum, Sanitas, or by spraying Sanitas, or Peroxide of Hydrogen in the room. If the room has a fire-place, kindle a little fire in it two or three times a day, and keep the fire-place open. Permangate of potash and oxalic acid, each one ounce, moistened with twice the amount of water in an open vessel, will emir ozone freely, and may be used in piace of the antiseptics named above.

Reduce to a minimum the possible lodging places of the germs, by striping the room of carpets, hangings, cuttains, furniture, bric-a-brac, and reduce it to one small table, the bed, and one chair for the nurse, unless an inexpensive cot be allowed for changing the patient to, in

order to have the bed aired and purified.

6. Disinfect all dishes and eating utensils and clothes used by or in contact with the patient, by washing the utensils in boiling water, and boiling the clothes not less than thirty minutes.

Of course, young children will have been sent away upon the outbreak of the disease, and all through the sickness a sheet moistened with a disinfectant has been hung across the door of the sick room. The article used should be the one most agreeable to the patient.

The nurse has not mingled with the family, and the loose wrapper that the mother has worn in the sick-room

has not been worn about the house.

DISINFECTION AFTER CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

By this is meant, whether the patient recovers or dies, the same care should be exercised to prevent infection by the disease germs.

1. Destroy by fire all inexpensive clothing, carpets, curtains or other fabrics, except such as are washable.

2. All washable articles should be boiled from twenty to forty minutes.

All beds, mattresses, bolsters, pillows, carpets, rugs, stuffing of chairs and cushions to be opened and submitted

to the action of hot steam fifteen minutes.

If there are no facilities for this, then fumigate them thoroughly twenty-four hours with burning sulphur in tin cans or earthen jars placed in water or on bricks. Allow one pound of sulphur to every 1,000 cubic feet of air space (found by multiplying height, breadth and length of the room together). Cover metalic surfaces which will tarnish with a mixture of tallow, oil and whiting. Hang blankets and spreads on a line in the middle of the room. Open closets and drawers, paste strips of paper around the windows, doors, and all cracks, including the fireplace. Pour a little alcohol over each can of sulphur and light the one furthest from the door first, then the others, and hasten out of the poisonous fumes, close the door and paste strips of paper around it on the outside. After twenty-four hours longer.

Another method is, after closing the room as above have in an earthern vessel a mixture of equal parts of common salt and black oxide of manganese, one ounce of each to every 100 cubic feet of air space. To each ounce of this mixture add one ounce of a fifty per cent. solution of sulphuric acid in water, and close the door at once for twenty-four hours, then ventilate twenty-four hours as before.

4. Wash the floor with a I to I,000 corrosive sublimate solution, or with Sanitas fluid. Spray the same over the walls and into all crevices of windows, doors, etc., and wash all the furniture with it after the upholstery has been removed. The corrosive sublimate solution is extremely poisonous.

5. Tear the paper from the walls and burn it, and whitewash thoroughly.

6. Wash picture frames, brass and iron work, etc., with Sanitas, unless covered with the preparation previously named.

7. Leave the windows open for two days, then scrub the floors with soap and soda; whitewash again and paint.

This is thorough disinfection, because it reaches the chief sources of danger, namely the floors, walls and furniture.

Bromine is an inexpensive by-product of the manufacture of salt, selling at seventy cents a pounds, and in solutions containing one part in weight to about eight hundred of water, it may be used freely without affecting anything it may touch. A few quarts will thoroughly deodorize an ordinary house. The undiluted bromine is strongly corrosive, and if it touches the skin causes a painful burn. CINNAMON, oil of, is a very useful antiseptic, while the

powder is a valuable astringent.

Peculiarly valuable in cholera, dysintery, diarrhea, etc. EUTHYMOL.

Parke, Davis & Co., Detroit, Mich. Antiseptic, nonpoisonous. Used as a spray, or internally in doses of one teaspoonful three or four times a day.

An excellent and agreeable substitute for iodoform and carbolic acid, and equal in antiseptic power. Must not

GLYCOZONE.

Is chemically pure glycerine and ozone, not mixed, but chemically combined under peculiar conditions.

It stimulates healthy granulations, acts in a general way like Hydrozone, which see, but much slower. Must not be taken with any drug, nor come in contact with any metal, but be used with glass or hard rubber.

The mistake should not be made of substituting a deodorizer for a disinfectant. An odor may be masked without the destruction of the attendant disease germs. The germs themselves may have no odor, therefore the danger may be just as great when the sense of smell detects nothing amiss, as when it is almost suffocated with effluvia.

Other disinfectants are here named in the order of their strength, but the weaker should not be relied upon in se-

rious diseases.

Corrosive sublimate, 64 grains to the gallon.

Carbolic acid, 5 per cent. solution. Bromine, 1 pound to 200 gallons.

Permanganate of potash, 17\(\frac{3}{4}\) ounces to 200 gallons.

Chloride of lime, 4 ounces to the gallon.

Sulphate of iron, 1½ pounds to the gallon.

Sulphate of zinc, 4 ounces to the gallon. Common salt, 2 ounces to the gallon.

STIMULANTS.

Stimulants are substances that arouse vital action. That they have a place in the physical economy is evident from the impossibility of distinguishing the dividing line between the effect of proper foods and that of weak stimulants.

It might also be inferred from the fact that man is constituted not only to act in response to, but to develop intellectual strength by mental stimulants.

It might also be argued from the fact that men instinctively resort to stimulants in certain conditions, as do animals likewise.

But this can never justify the use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage, nor the habitual table use of condiments.

The physiological effect of stimulants is to increase the red-blood cells for a few days, but unless fresh material for them to live upon is also supplied they soon perish, proving conclusively that the normal use for stimulation is transient only.

The weakness of the idea of toning the system by so-

called tonics is just here.

Their tonicity consists in their power of stimulation. But as the system loses its susceptibility to feel that stimulation with every repetition of the dose, and as the drug gives no nutriment to the cells first proliferated, it follows that no really tonic effect is possible.

What seems such in some cases is the first effect of stimulation supported and made permanent by added nutrition.

There is a class of extreme cases in which the ordinary effects of stimulation are overborne and benefit secured, e. g., whiskey by the pint for snake bites, in which the alcohol acts as a germicide; brandy or whiskey, a pint or more in twenty-four hours, in some cases of double pneumonia, etc., in which the alcohol acts as a force food and as a germicide, and its stimulation supports (temporarily) the vital energies.

But as a rule-

It is only when the vital powers need to be aroused temporarily that their use should be permitted.

Capsicum, or red pepper, is a pure stimulant, by far the best and safest for use under nearly all circumstances, and is a powerful antiseptic.

Mustard, externally, comes next; and there is scarcely any form of depression that cannot be more safely and successfully met by one or both of these than by any drug or drugs of the materia medica.

The capsicum may be used in from one to three-grain doses, repeated according to the urgency of the symptoms

from one to six hours.

The mustard, in the form of plasters, dry rubs, or in baths deserves far more general use than it has, c. g., in the determination of blood to a part, the application of a mustard plaster to its immediate vicinity, and as soon as the surface reddens thoroughly, that removed and another just beyond its further border, and so on, until an extremity is reached, will often remove the most stubborn cases of congestion.

RELAXANTS.

Relaxants are substances that loosen the texture of the fibres of the tissues, and are useful in rigid conditions. The warm bath is one of the best. Ladies' slipper and labelia are the best herbal relaxants.

Lobelia is decried by Allopaths because, they claim, that in two or three instances in the history of medicine it has had a fatal effect, but there is no positive proof of a single instance, while there is positive proof of fatal results in thousands of cases from drugs that they prescribe freely every day, e.g., who does not know that morphine has slain its thousands. Morphine is a relaxant, but the further its effects extend the more disturbed do the pulsations become. On the other hand, the more pronounced the effect of lobelia, the more regular does the pulsa become.

ASTRINGENTS.

Astringents are substances that contract and tighten the fibres of the tissues, consequently relaxants and actringents are exact apposites. That their use is admissable to some extent, may be inferred from the fact than both exist in foods that are instinctively sought, e.g., some from are strongly astringent while others are relaxant.

In often happens that one or the other of these, used for its appropriate condition, is a great reinforcement to the Cell-Suls, and even to the germicidal remedies that may be required. Among the most available and harmless astringents are blackberry most, oak bark, germium, hem-lock bark, fanic acid, witch hanel, summe and commande.

Tonics only differ from ustringents in that they are supposed to have a more permanent impression. The wisdom of their use is very questionable.

CHAPTER VII.

THE INDEPENDENT AND THE CO-OPERATIVE CURATIVES OF CHRISTIAN FAITH.

This book was first announced to the public as in course of preparation in June, 1896, but for various reasons was not given to the printer until June 7, 1897.

Notwithstanding present haste to issue it, I cannot allow

Notwithstanding present haste to issue it, I cannot allow it to close without a brief final chapter upon "The Independent and The Co-operative Curatives of Christian Faith."

The best statement of *The Independent Curative* is found in James 5:13-15:

"Is any sick among you? let him call for the elders of the church; and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord: and the prayer of faith shall save the sick, and the Lord shall raise him up."

The doctrine is simply this:

The prayer of faith shall save the sick. But inasmuch as we "know not what to pray for as we ought," i. e., whether it is our privilege to pray in faith for recovery, God informs us by a certain process explained in Romans 8:26: "The Spirit itself maketh intercession for us with groanings (sighings) which cannot be uttered." That is, the Holy Spirit within us helps our pleadings, impels to vehement wrestlings for the desired good, and whenever that Spirit-helped intercession is felt, it is God's personal assurance that it is "according to His will" (verse 27) that this boon shall be granted upon the one condition of the faith of the supplicant.

That this doctrine produces accordant facts I KNOW by more than one personal experience, but notably by the healing of my lameness of twenty-five years' standing, as narrated in-

"MY TWENTY-FIFTH YEAR JUBILEE,"

published in 1875:

That it was made the subject of ridicule by many is true; but I wish to write in this, my latest work, that, while there are some slight matters in that narrative that probably would not have been stated in just the words they were had they been written some years later, yet no FACT was misstated; and after twenty years of experience, and much investigation of the physical, psychical and religious principles involved, I KNOW, as well as I know the fact of my conversion, that my cure was an act of Divine healing, independent of the use of natural remedial agents.

Furthermore, I am positively certain, that the same principles and methods of reasoning by which it was sought to be explained upon natural principles, if applied to personal religious experience, would unchristianize every Christian who now lives or ever has lived, if accepted.

Note the doctrine well—its limitations and its safeguard. God's will is the arbiter. That will-disclosed by the Holy Spirit in the heart of the sufferer-is the personal encouragement to the act of faith.

It is useless to inquire why He selects one, and passes by the multitude. I only know that it is not because of the superior piety, talents or influence of the chosen ones; but the positive elements that determine His choice must remain unknown in this life.

The practical application of the subject in a domestic medical work is simply this, viz. : It is right for the sufferer to offer the testing prayer to see if it receives the intercessional help, without which the prayer for cure should be changed to a prayer that the affliction may be sanctified to the soul's good, and blessed to the good of others; but with which—

> "To doubt would be di-loyalty, To falter would be sin."

King Asa "in his disease sought not the Lord, but to the physicians." "And Asa slept with his fathers."—2 Chron, 16:12-13.

The Co-operative Helps of Christian Faith involve the same principles of God's sovereign will offering the privilege, and man's faith personally and consciously claiming it, but instead of receiving the help without the intervention of naturally curative agents, it is expected through such means. Sometimes with no specially suggested ones; at other times with the means clearly defined and imperative. In either case there is a curative efficiency displayed far beyond the mere encouragement of expectancy of relief, yet, may be, quite indefinite in measure, or may include complete recovery.

The Christian should never fail to seek this help. Its workings are amid the primal movements of cell-formation just where life lays its hand upon insensate matter, and

bids it to live. Hence, its help is radical.

But the seeking should always be in the same spirit in which His independent help is sought—not with resignation, for there is no room for resignation unless the petition is denied—but with a spirit of consecrated subjection that will at once become resignation upon occasion.

"In those days was Hezekiah sick unto death. Then he turned his face to the wall and prayed." And Isaiah was sent to him with this message: "I have heard thy prayer, and have seen thy tears; behold. I will heal thee." "And Isaiah said, take a lump of figs. And they took and laid it on the boil, (probably malignant carbuncle), and he recovered." 2 Kings. 20:1, 2, 5, 7.
